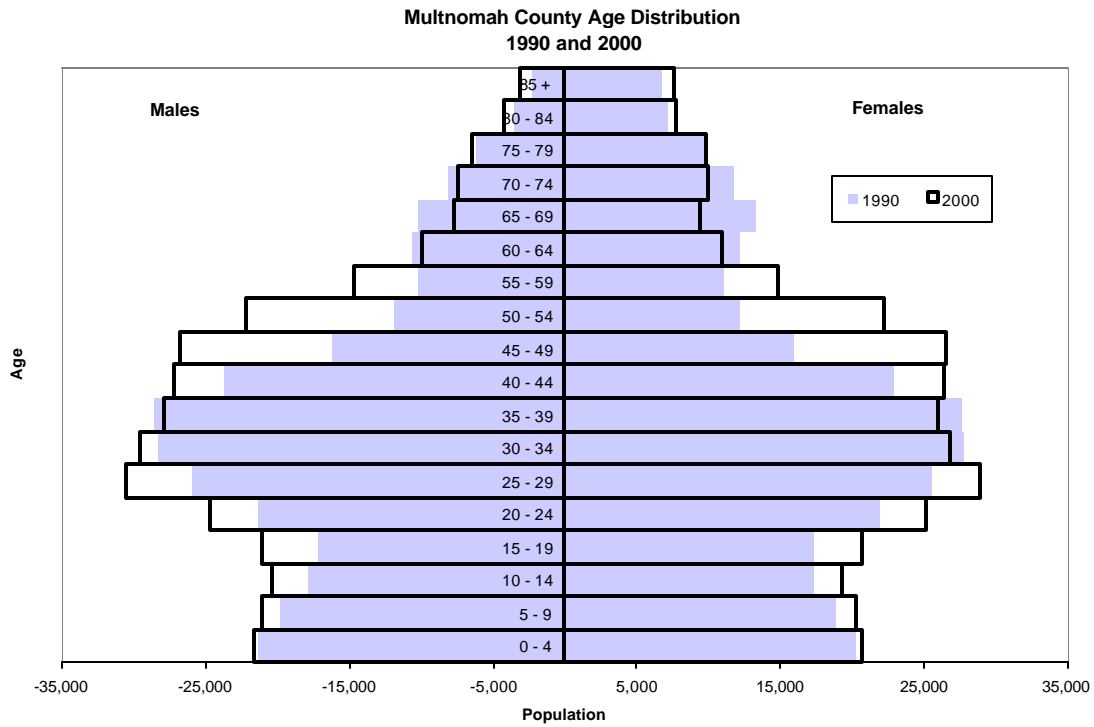

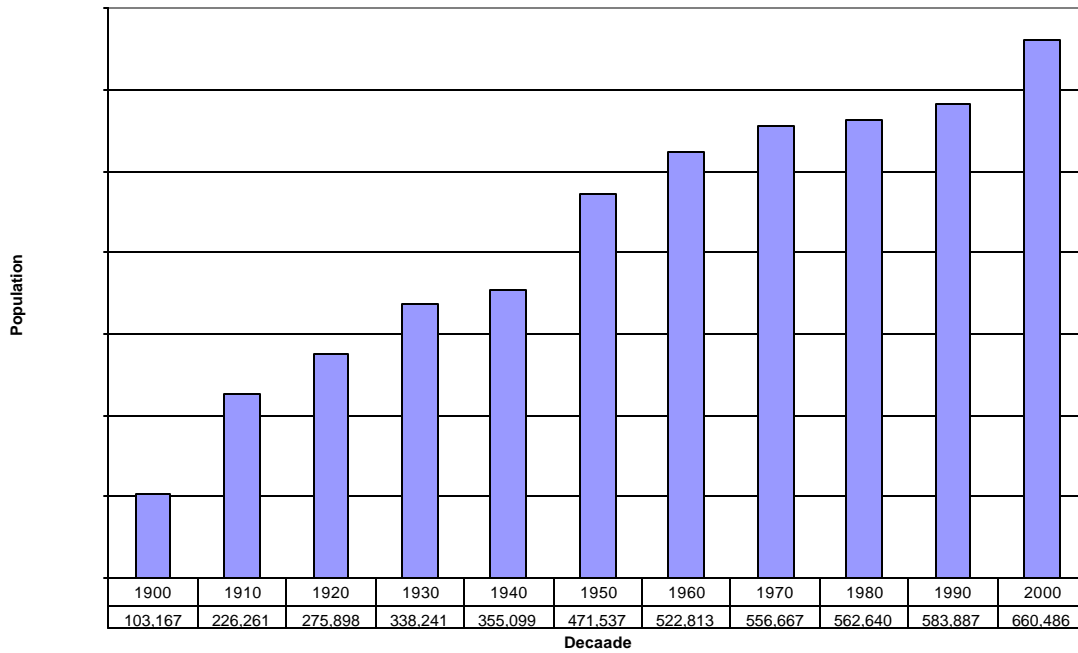

POPULATION CHANGE IN MULTNOMAH COUNTY

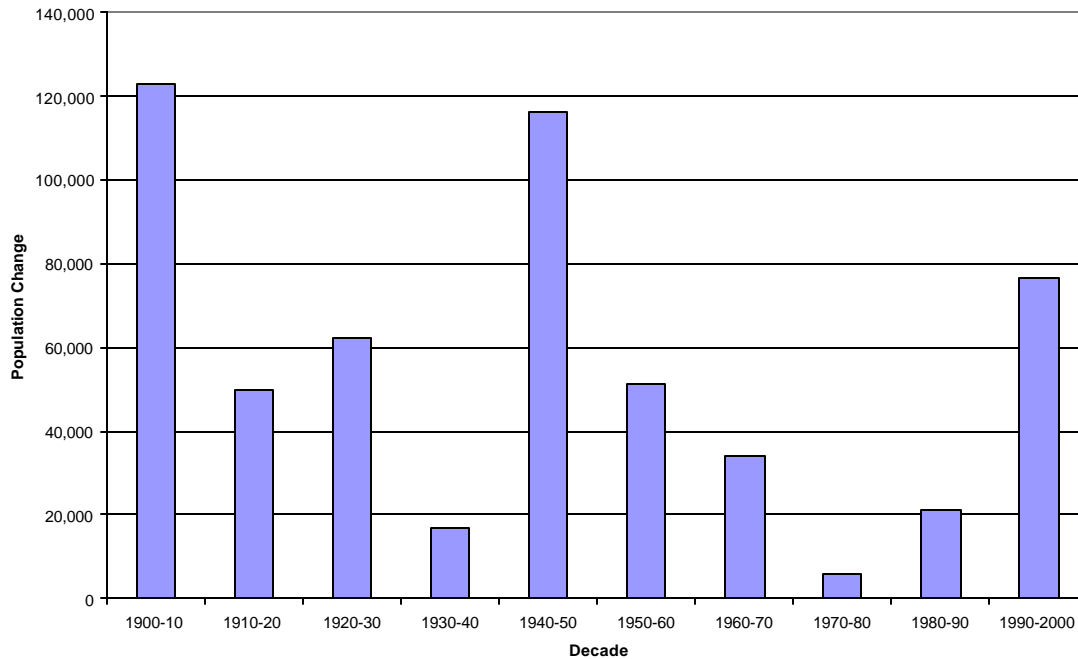
The Population of Multnomah County has grown continuously over the past century.

Population of Multnomah County, 1900 to 2000

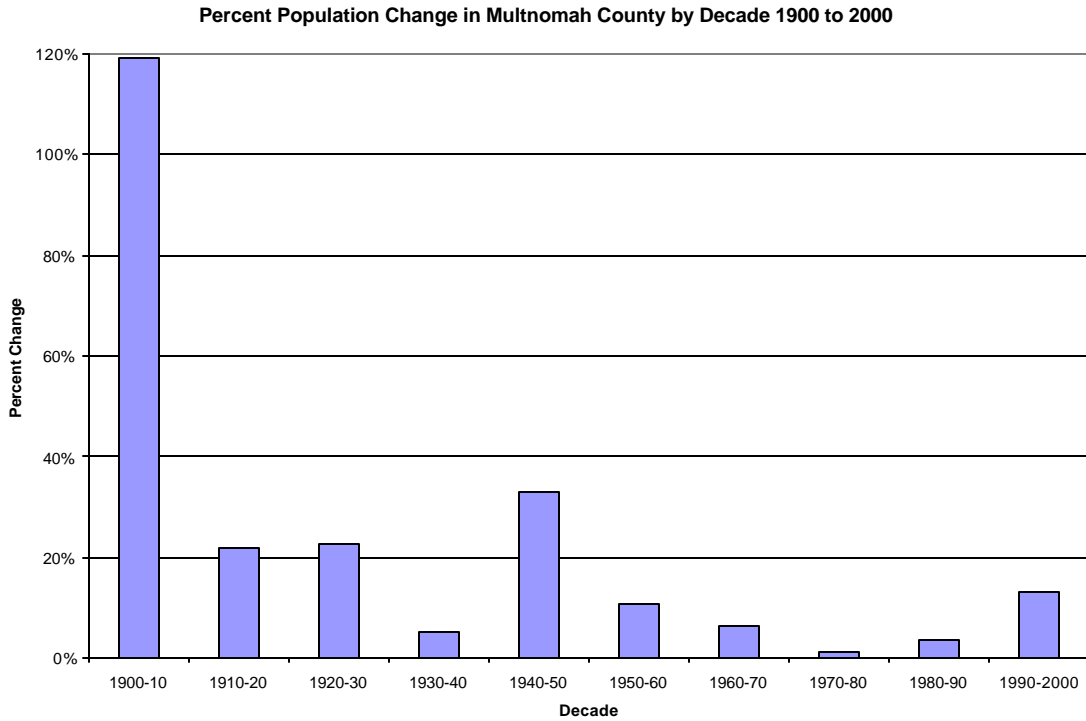


Absolute population change has not been even over the decades.

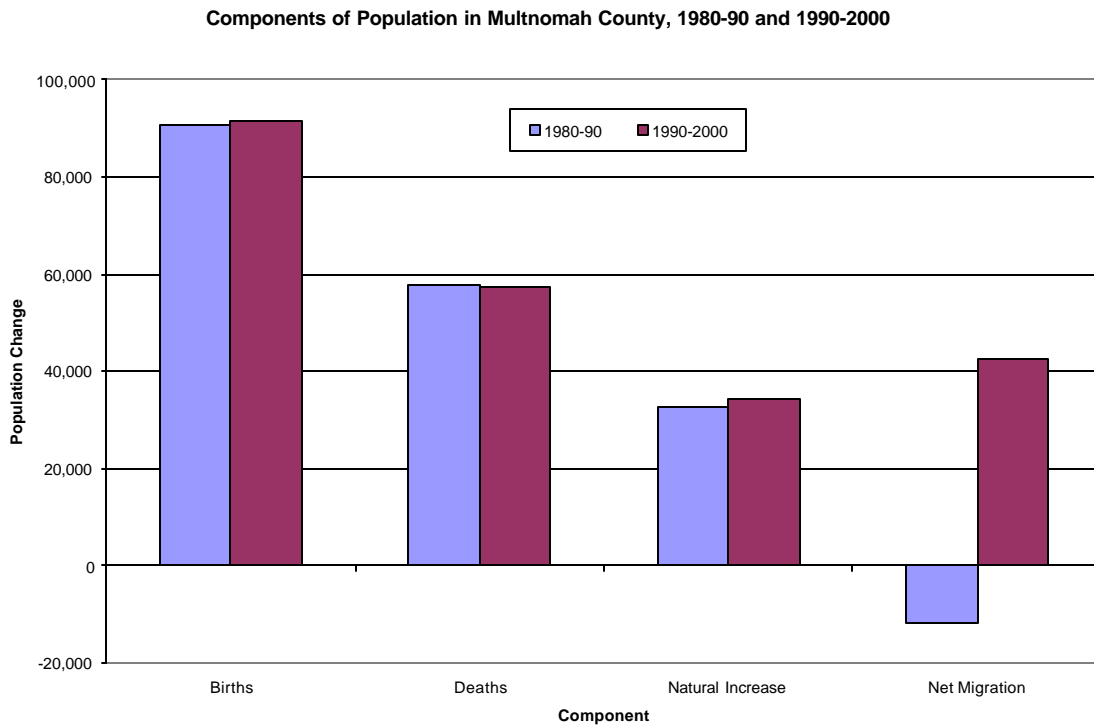
Population Change in Multnomah County by Decade 1900 to 2000



Relative population change has also been uneven.

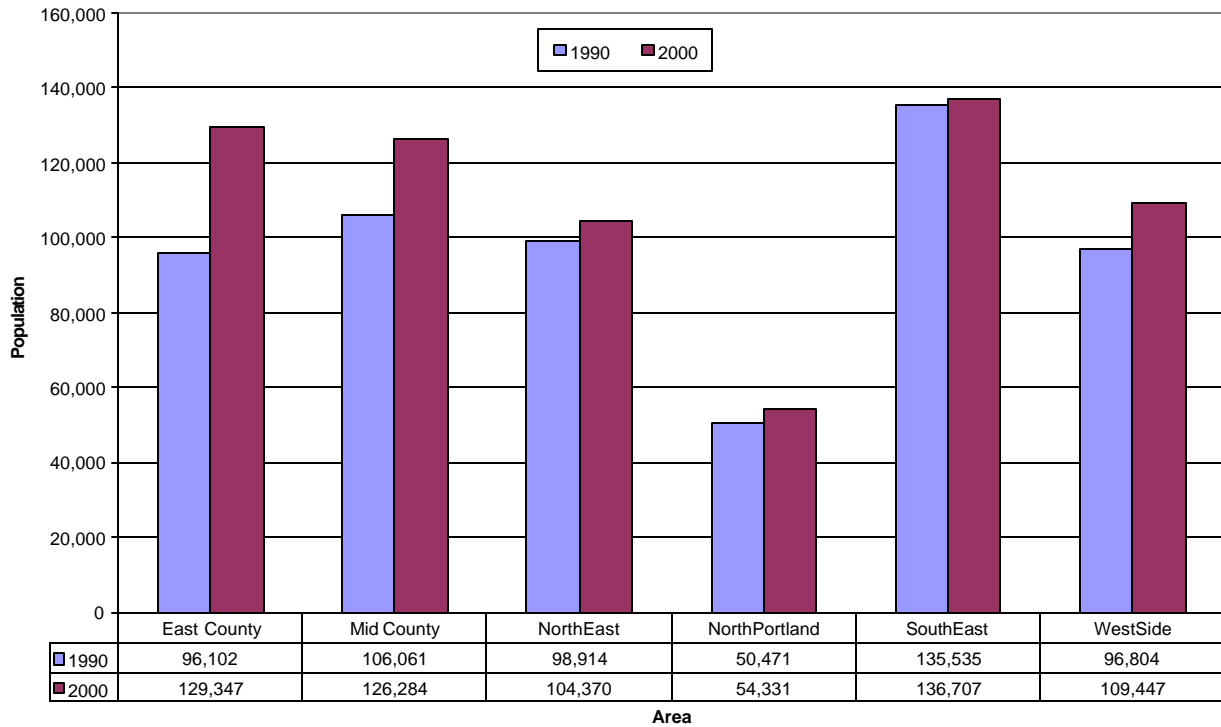


Natural change components have remained constant over the past 2 decades whereas net migration has reflected economic conditions.



Population change was unevenly distributed over Multnomah County Areas during the past decade.

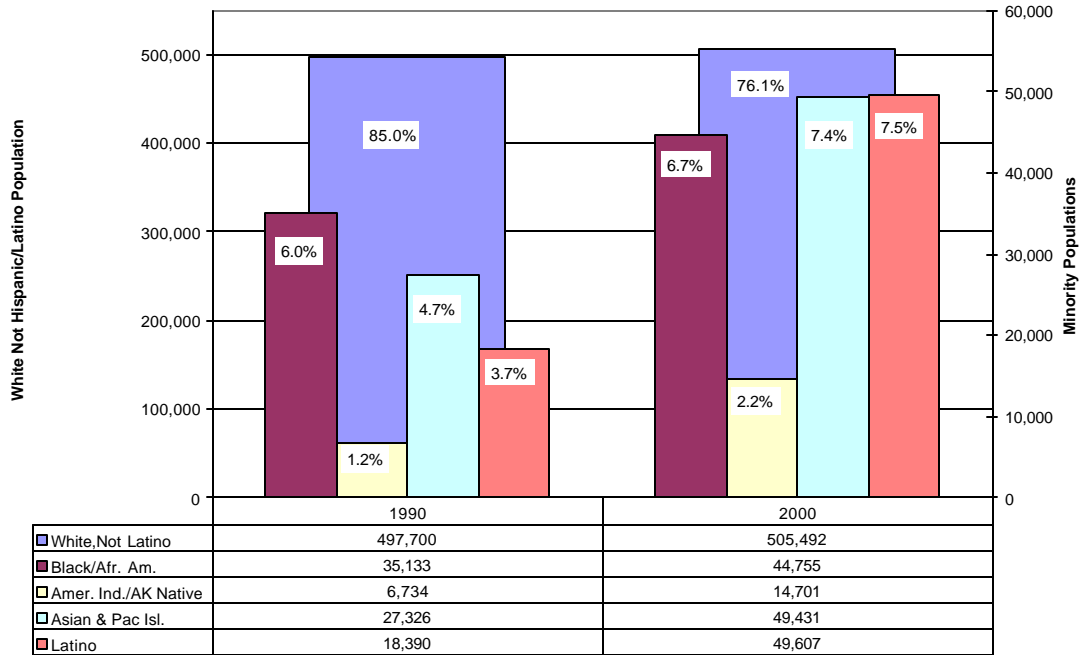
Population of Multnomah County by Area 1990 and 2000



RACIAL AND ETHNIC COMPOSITION

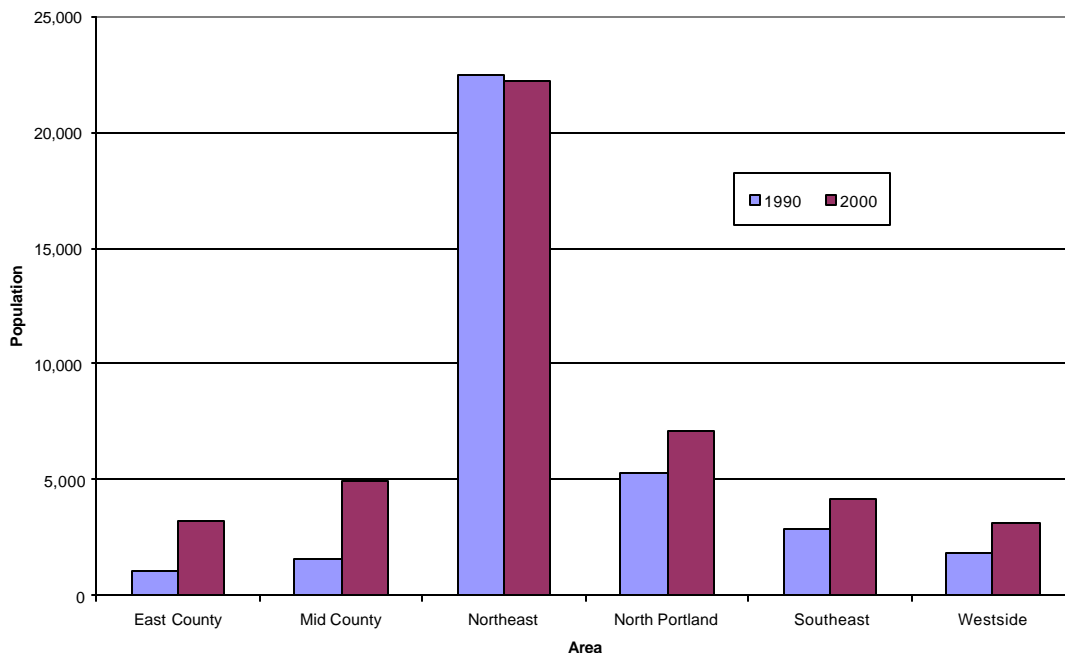
Multnomah County has become more racially/ethnically diverse over the past decade.

(Note: Race categories are not strictly comparable.)



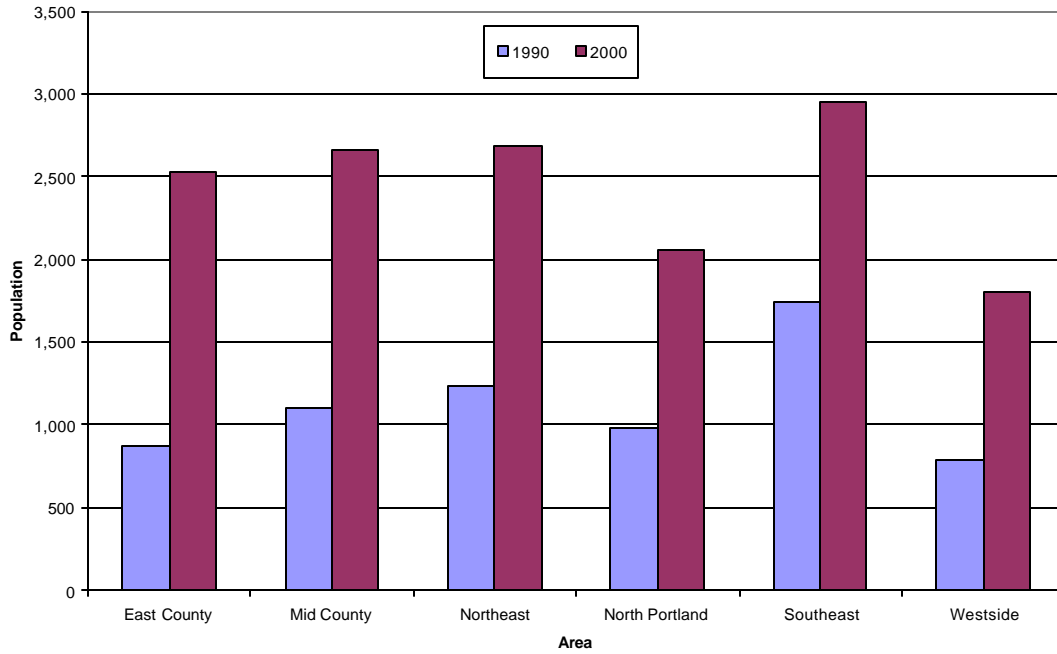
The African-American Population is concentrated in Northeast Multnomah County, but is expanding into other areas of the county.

(Note: Categories are not strictly comparable between 1990 and 2000.)



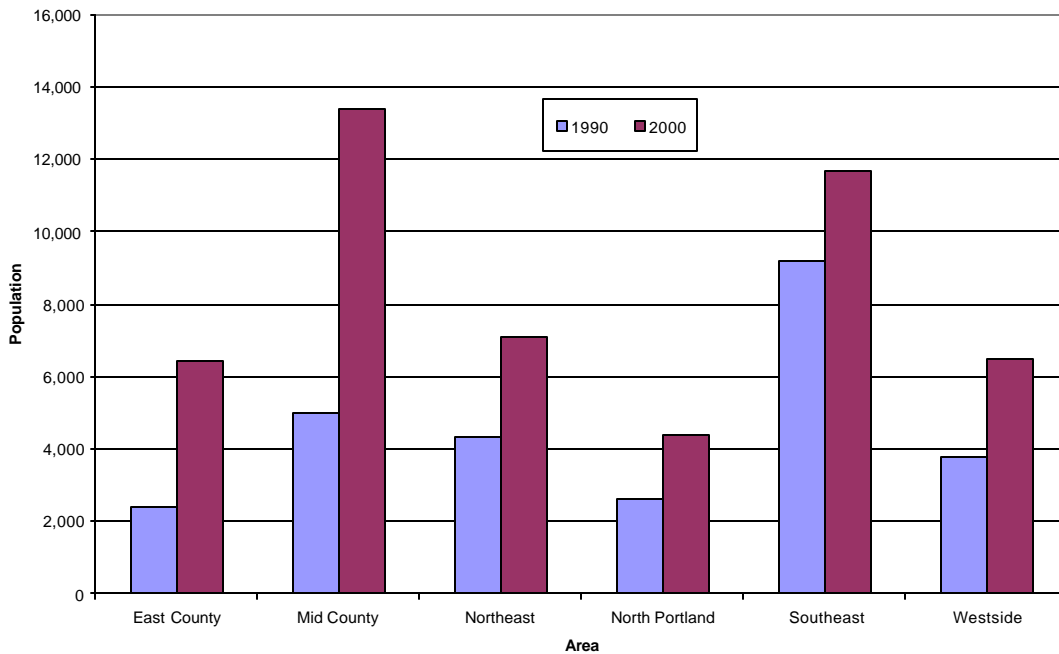
The American Indian/Alaska Native Population is fairly evenly distributed by area.

 (Note: Categories are not strictly comparable between 1990 and 2000.)



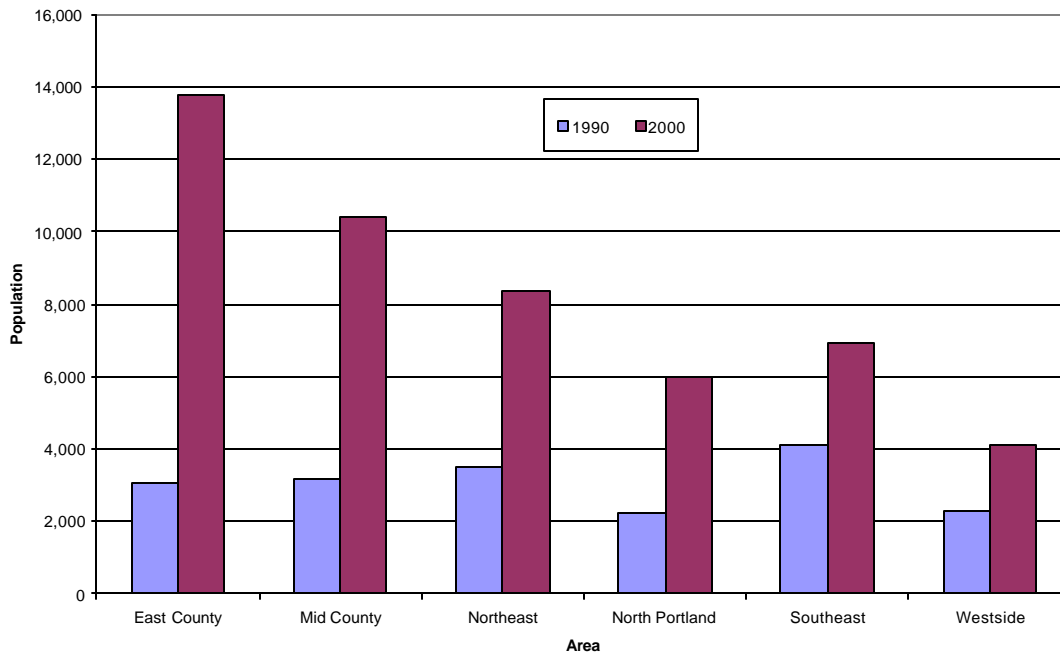
Asian and Pacific Islander Population is concentrated in a few areas, but growing in other areas.

 (Note: Categories are not strictly comparable between 1990 and 2000.)



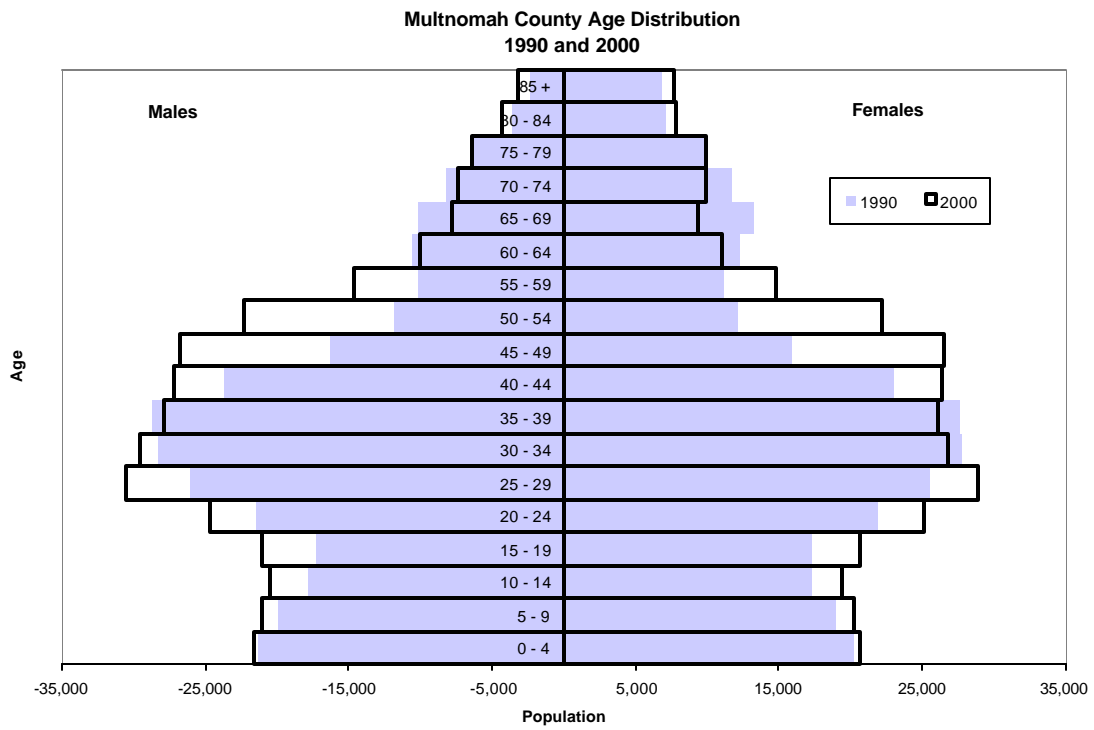
The Hispanic Origin/Latino Population is concentrated in mid to east county, but is rapidly growing in other areas as well.

Hispanic/Latino Population by Area Multnomah County 1990 and 2000

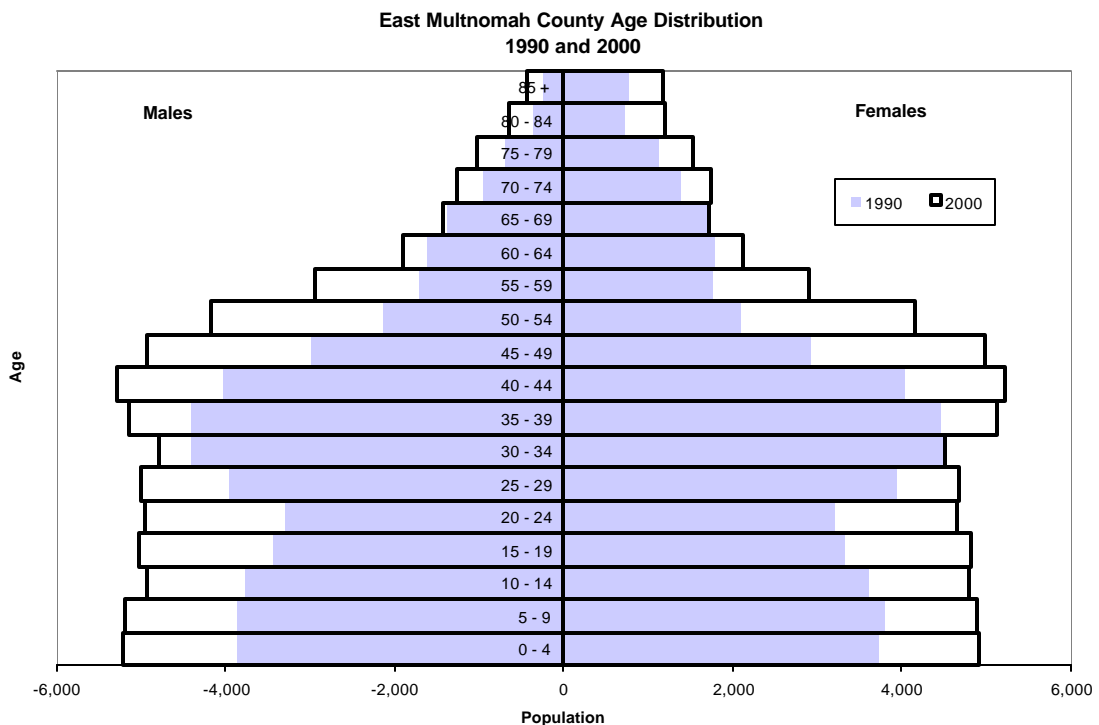


AGE DISTRIBUTION – THE DYNAMICS OF CHANGE

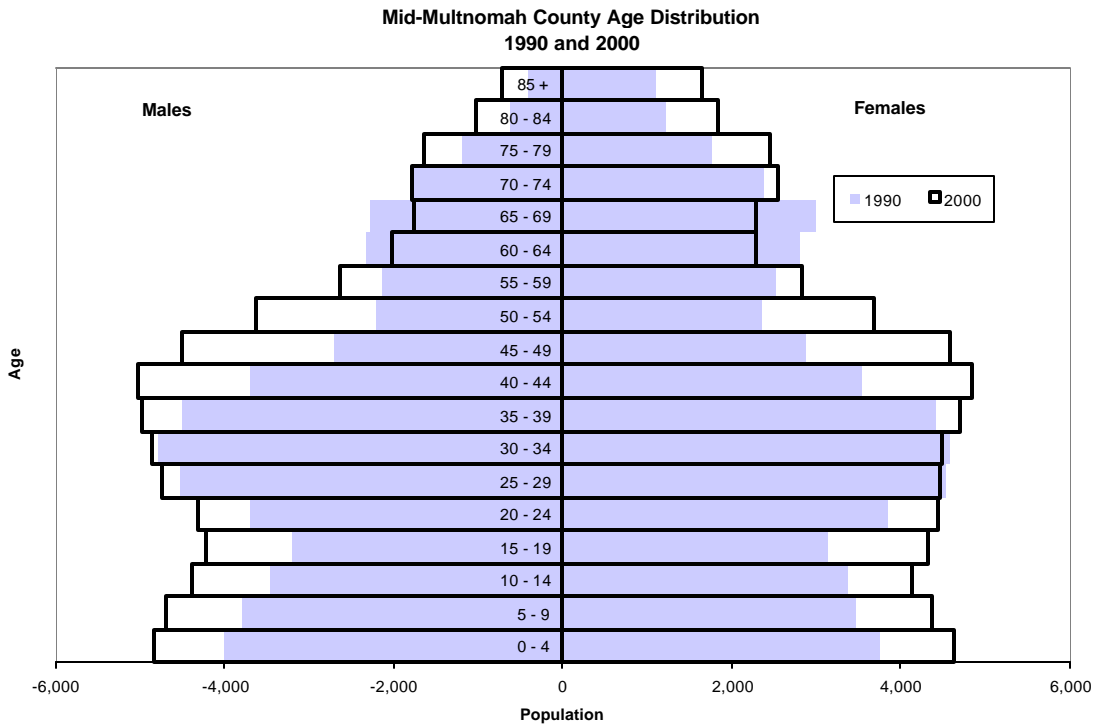
Net In-Migration of 15-39 year-olds provided much of the growth for the county.



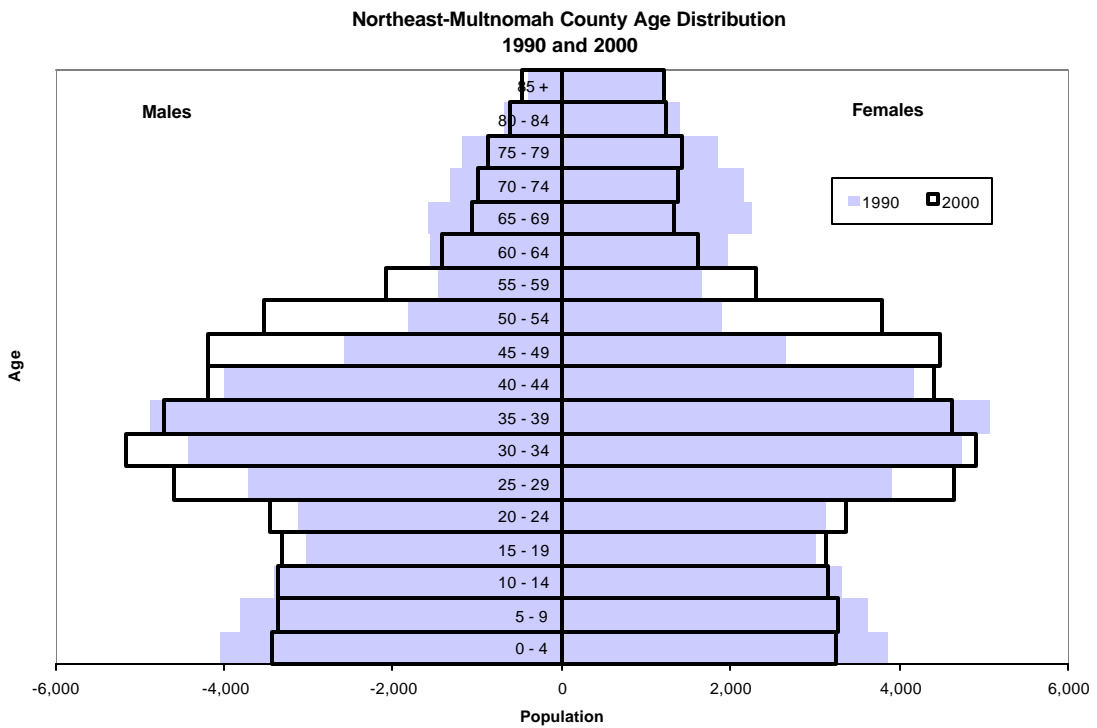
East County growth occurred among all age groups.



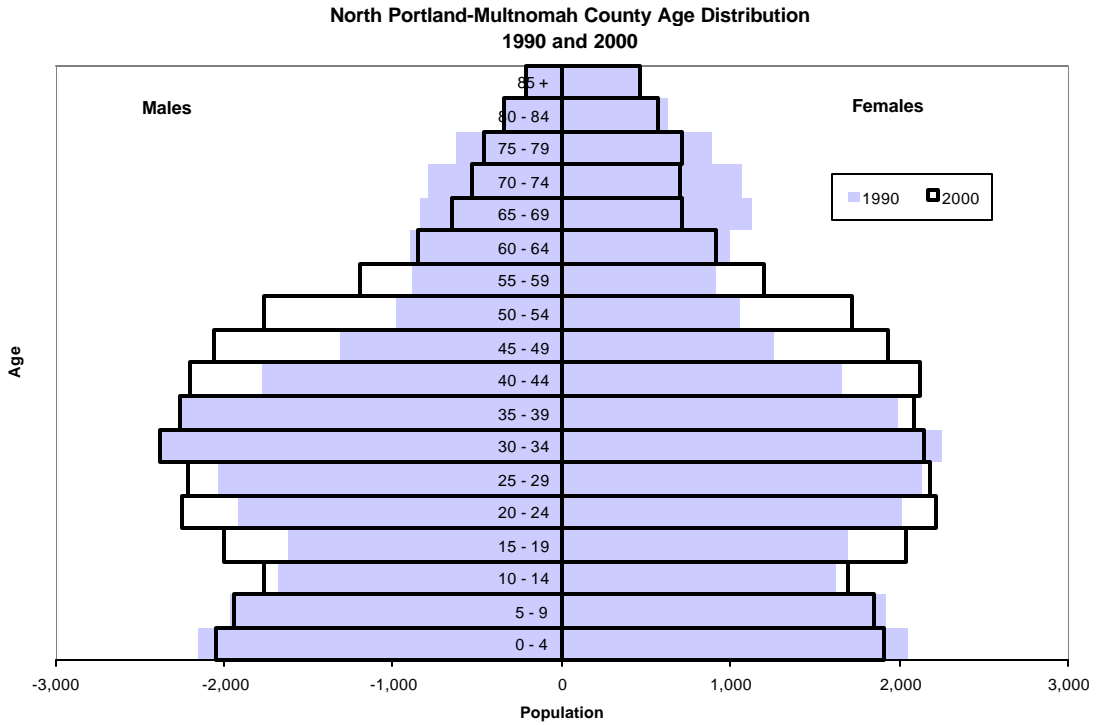
Mid-County also experienced growth for most age groups.



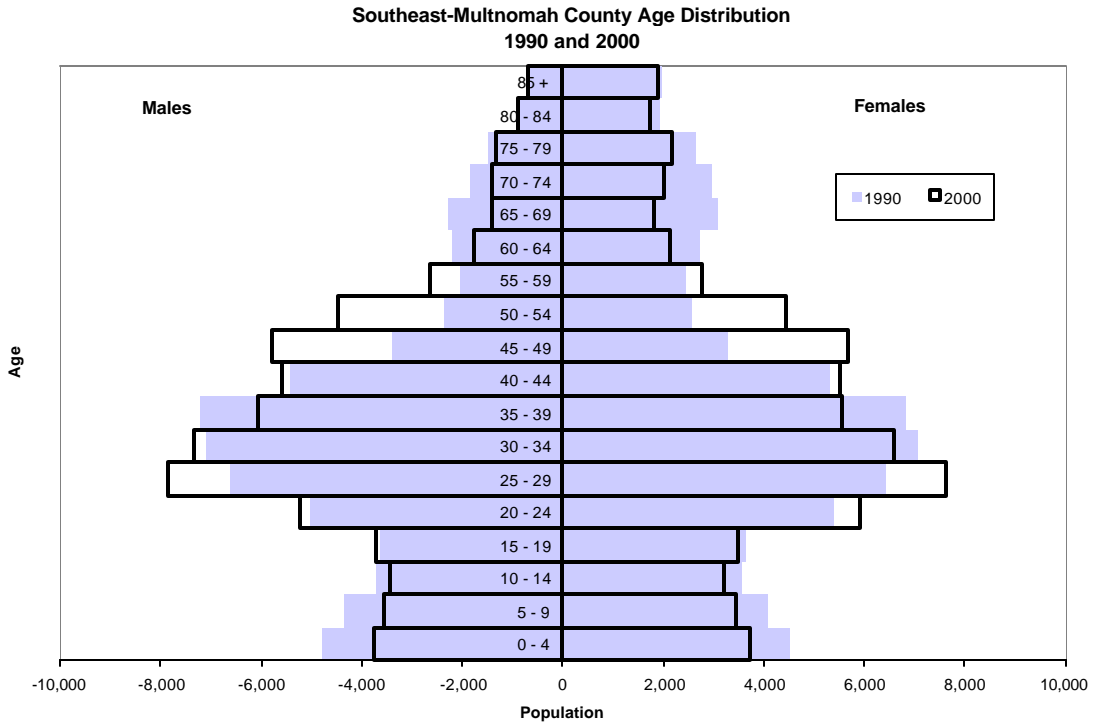
Northeast County replaced the elderly and the young with 25-39 year-olds.



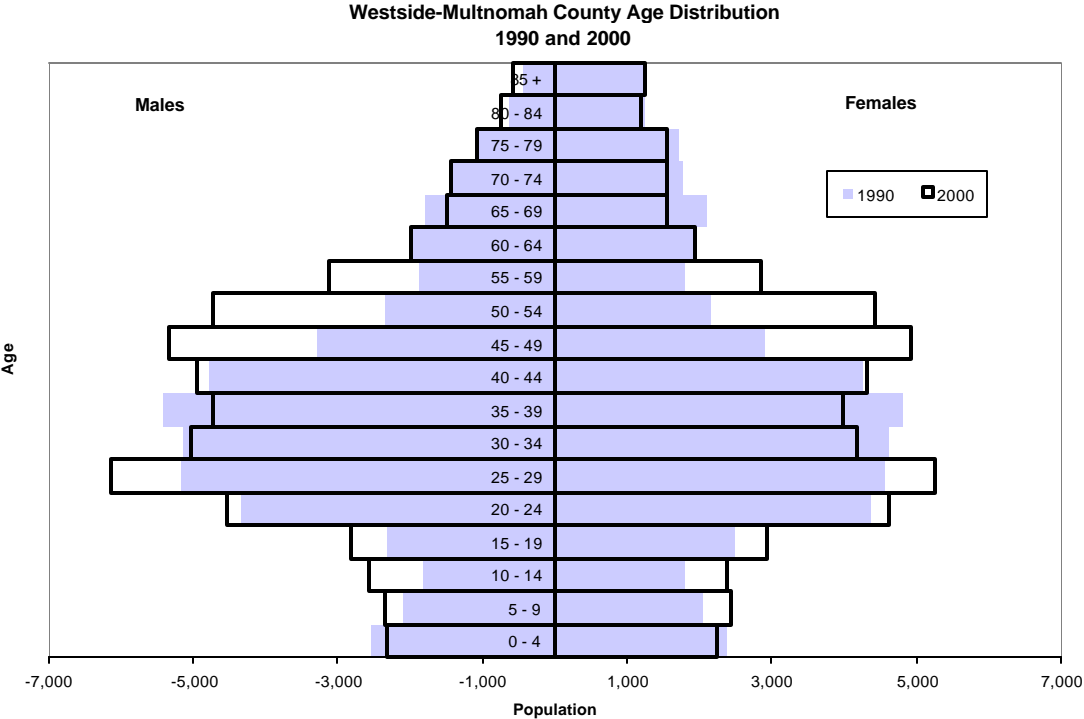
North Portland also replaced the elderly and young with 20-34 year-olds.



Southeast County saw an influx of 20-34 year-olds and a departure of all other age groups.

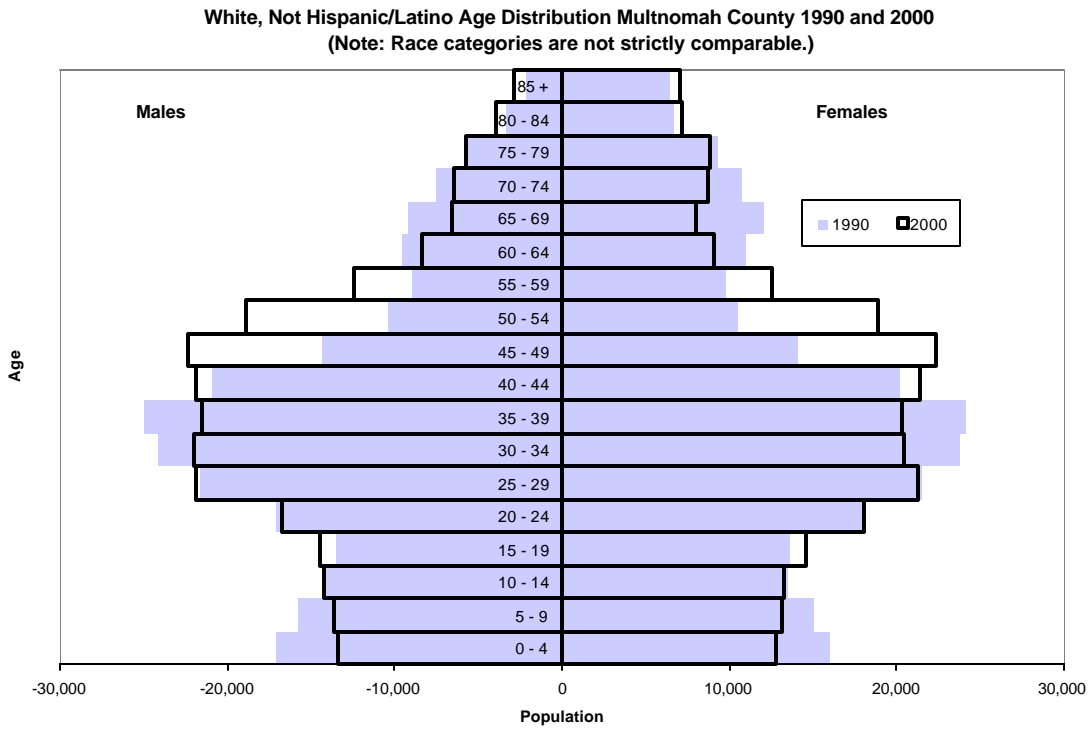


Westside growth was dominated by the 20-29 year-old population.

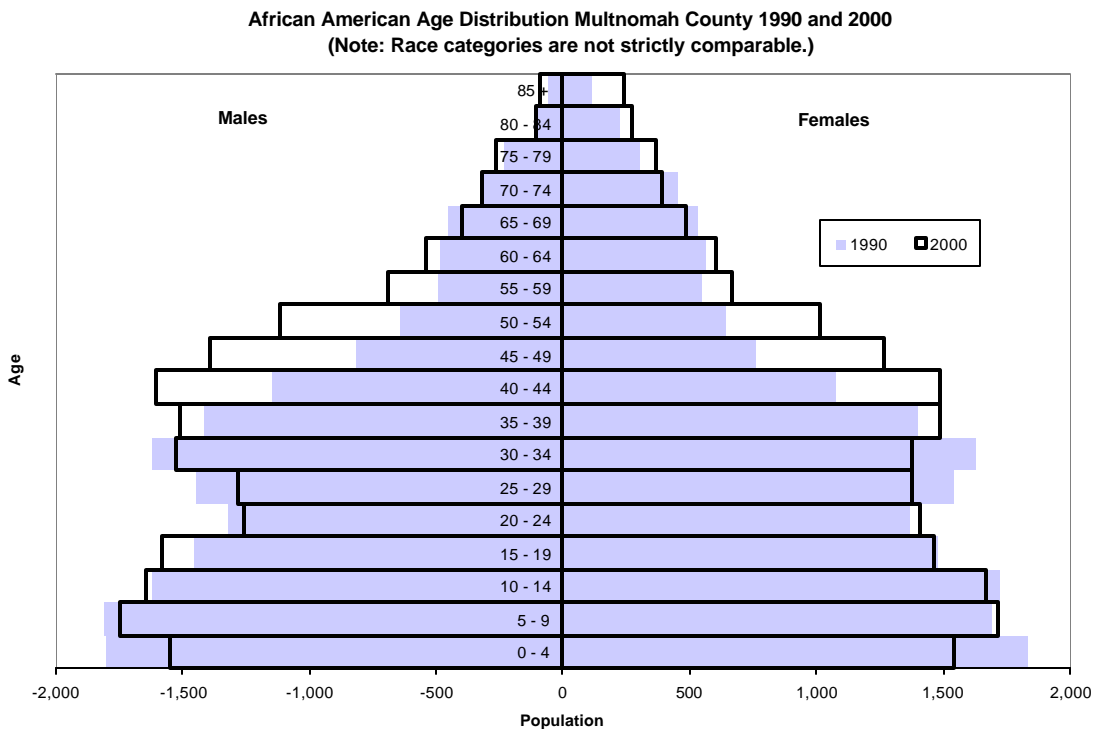


AGE CHANGES BY RACE/ETHNICITY

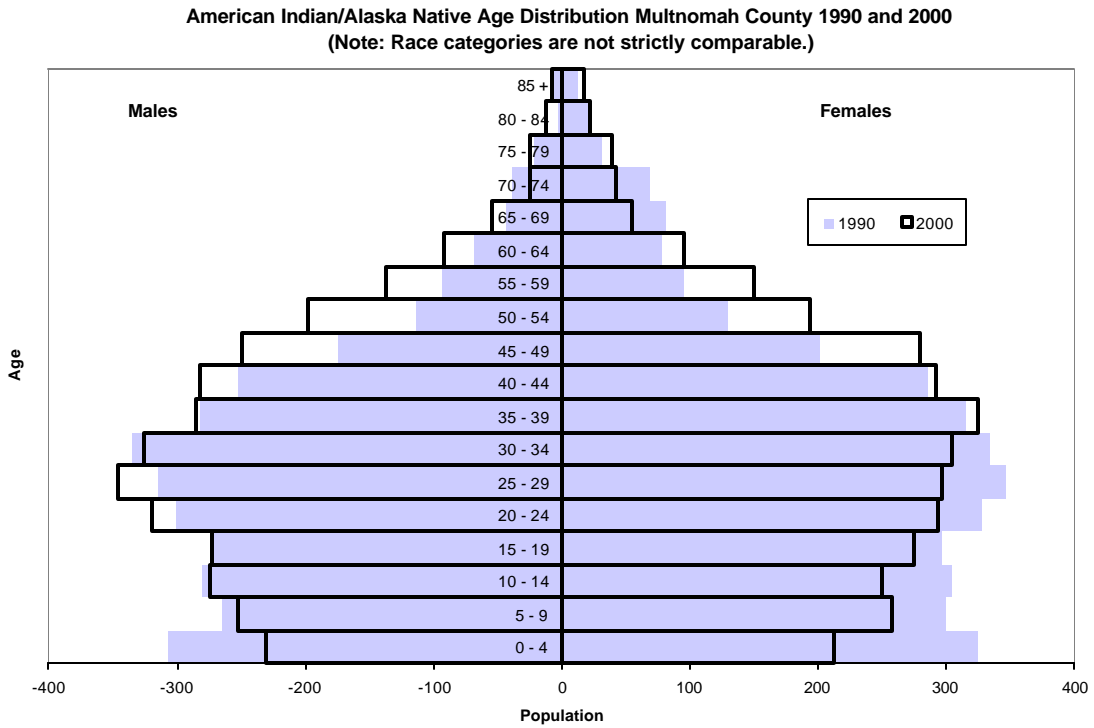
Gains in ages 20-34 offset losses at all other ages among the White/Non-Latino Population.



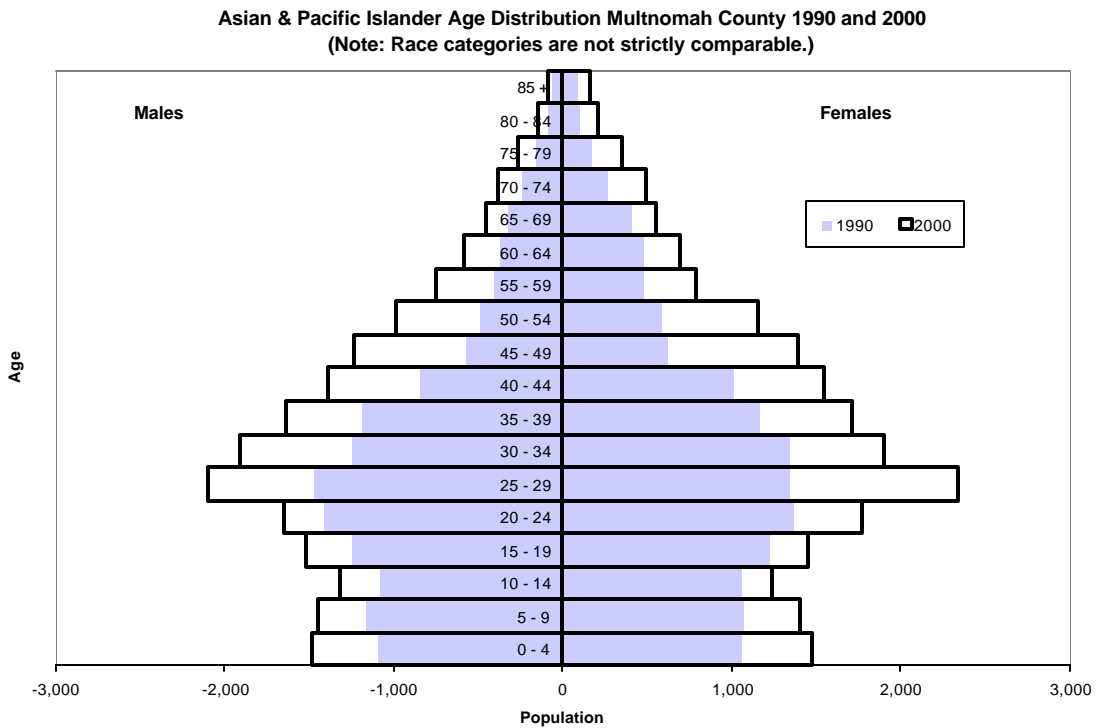
The African-American population has mostly aged in place.



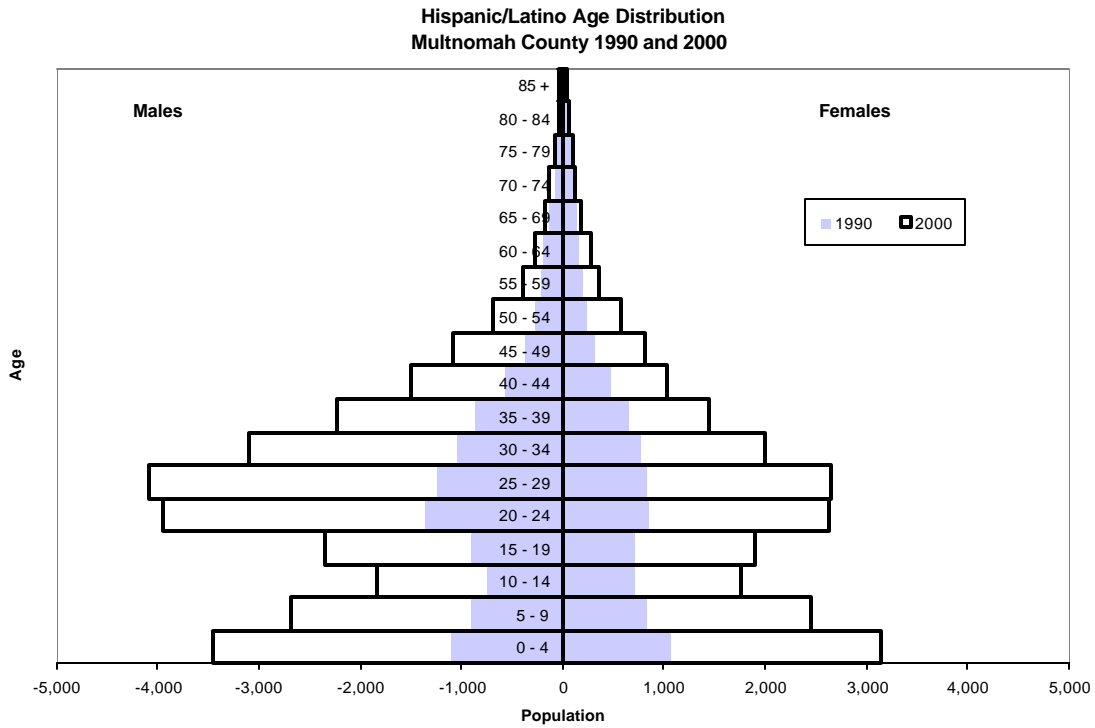
The American Indian/Alaska Native Population aged in place, but multi-racial identification may provide more information.



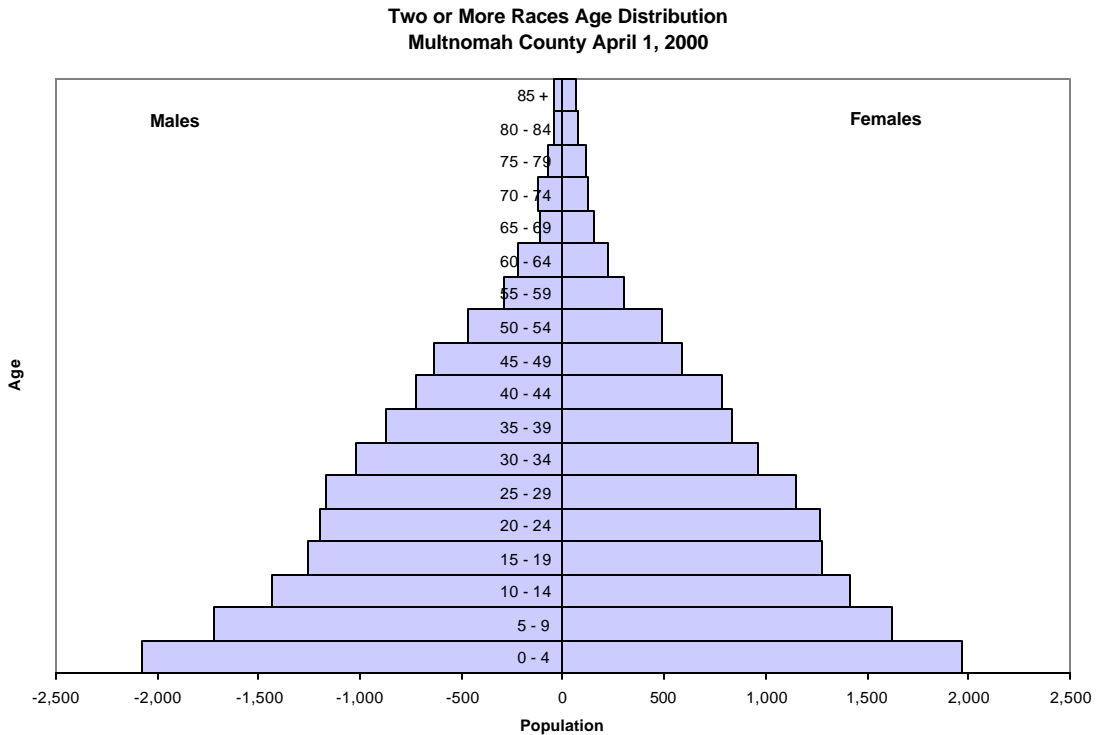
The Asian & Pacific Islander Population grew for almost every age group.



The Latino Population grew for most ages, but mostly for young adults and children, and especially males.



The Population of Two or More Races decreases rapidly with age.



The Ratio of the White Non-Latino Population to other racial/ethnic groups varies with age – more minority representation at the younger ages.
