Academic and Student Affairs Committee Charter

The Academic and Student Affairs Committee is established to oversee the academic and student affairs of the University. The Committee shall consist of the trustees appointed by the Chair. The Provost, the Vice President for Enrollment Management, the Vice Provost for Student Affairs, the Vice President of Research and Graduate Studies, and the Faculty Senate Presiding Officer shall be ex-officio non voting members of the Committee. The Committee is responsible for (1) ensuring and protecting, within the context of shared governance, the educational quality of the University and its academic programs and the quality and adequacy of its student support services, (2) monitoring progress towards the University's academic quality and student success goals, (3) advising the Board regarding major changes to the academic programs of the

University, such as the creation, merger or closure of degree programs, schools or colleges within the University, and (4) oversight of implementation of the University's strategic plan goals related to academic affairs, research, student success and student wellbeing. The Committee is responsible for such other matters as may be referred to it by the Board or Chair. The Office of Academic Affairs is responsible for providing staff support to the Committee.

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About This Document

Oregon Revised Statute (ORS) 352.002 and ORS 352.089 establish Portland State University as an Oregon public university and outlines the guidelines for creating an environment that encourages data informed decision-making consistent with the university's mission.

The primary purpose of this document is to provide a historical review and current status of Portland State University's academic portfolio to the existing membership of the Board of Trustees. It also serves as an educational tool and reference source to incoming Board of Trustee members and institutional leadership.

The graphical representations and summaries throughout this document aim to:

Enhance transparency across University's academic profile.

Represent information in a manner that is easily replicable.

Provide information that is comprehensive and comparable.

The information used to compile this document is referenced throughout the document and is consistent with publicly available information about Portland State University.



Accreditation

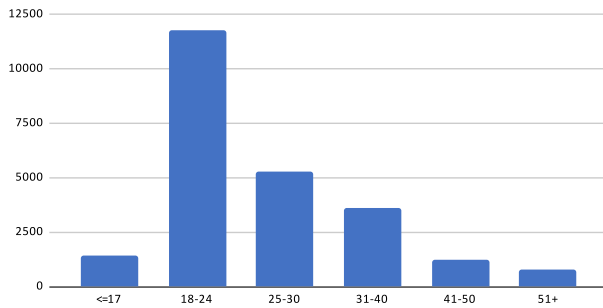
Portland State University has been accredited continuously by the Northwest Commission on Colleges and Universities (NWCCU) since receiving initial accreditation in 1955. The NWCCU accredits Portland State University at the bachelor's, master's, and doctoral degree levels. Regional accreditation is a process of recognizing educational institutions for performance, integrity, and quality that entitles them to the confidence of the educational community and the public. NWCCU accreditation is not partial and applies to the entire institution.

Accreditation is a requirement in order for PSU to receive federal funding, including student loans and federal grants. The Commission most recently reaffirmed the accreditation of the University on the basis of a Fall 2015 Year Seven Mission Fulfillment and Sustainability evaluation. Regional accreditation with

NWCCU does not expire, but is reaffirmed in a seven year cycle through a determination of compliance with the Commission's Eligibility Requirements, Standards, and Policies. The University's next comprehensive evaluations are the Year 6: Policies, Regulations, and Financial Review scheduled for Fall 2021 and the Year 7: Evaluation of Institutional Effectiveness report scheduled for Fall of 2022.

Specialized accreditation of certain programs is granted by a number of national organizations, each representing a professional area such as education, business, engineering, music, architecture, public policy, healthcare, and others. Each of these organizations has its distinctive definitions of eligibility, and criteria for accreditation. Accreditation by a specialized accrediting agency is one means of assuring the quality of the accredited programs.

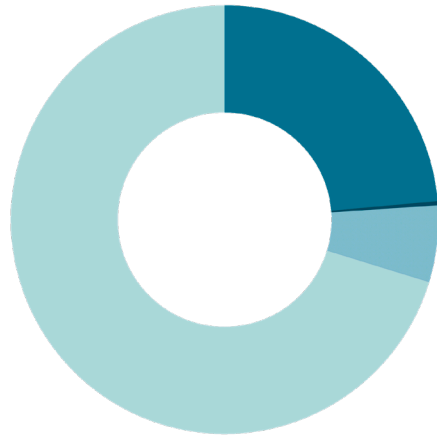

The following guidance is necessary for interpreting the following presentations of school/college information.

The data presented represents Academic Year 2021 (AY21) which comprises summer term 2020, fall term 2020, winter term 2021 and spring term 2021; as well as Fiscal Year 2021 (FY21) covering the time period July 1, 2020 - June 30, 2021.

For all intents and purposes within this report "AY21" and "FY21" are synonymous.

Research data is displayed in **grey text boxes**. All research data is provided by Research and Graduate Studies.

Student credit hour production data and graphical presentations are displayed in **blue color palettes and text boxes**.

The data represents aggregate student credit hours of all types and for all student levels produced during AY21.

All credit hour production data is provided by OIRP, source: SCARF end of term. Online credit production data source: Datamaster, Online Learning Dashboard.

Faculty data and graphical presentations are displayed in **red color palettes and text boxes**.

Faculty Full Time Equivalent (FTE) and Headcount (HC) is calculated during the annual employee census, conducted the first week of November each year by Human Resources and OIRP.

The following faculty counts in both FTE and HC are for FY21 and categorized by adjunct, fixed term hourly (FT Hourly), non-tenure track faculty (NTTF), tenure track faculty and tenured faculty.

Only tenure track and tenured positions filled at the time of the annual census are tabulated in the data and are defined as "active tenure lines".

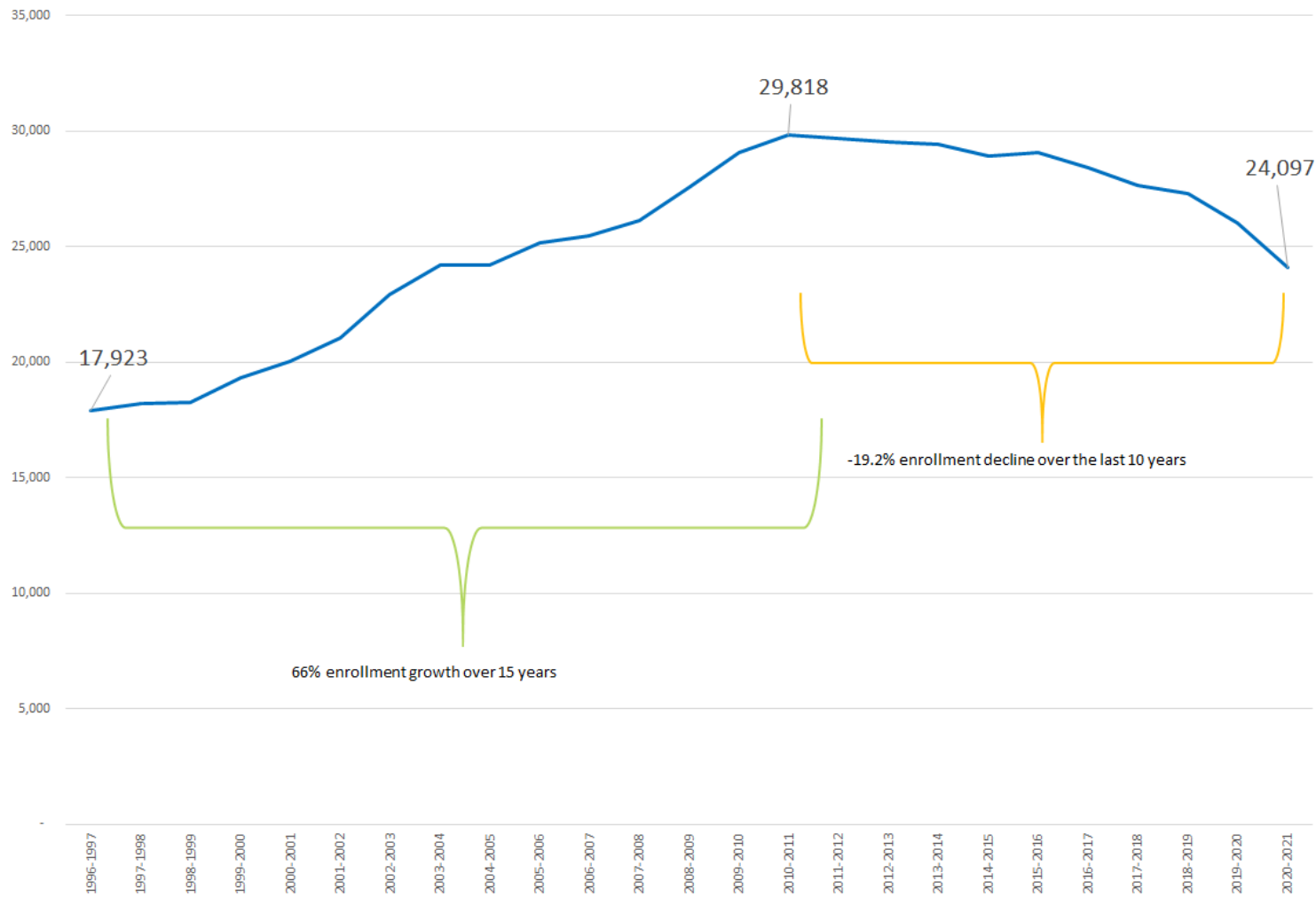

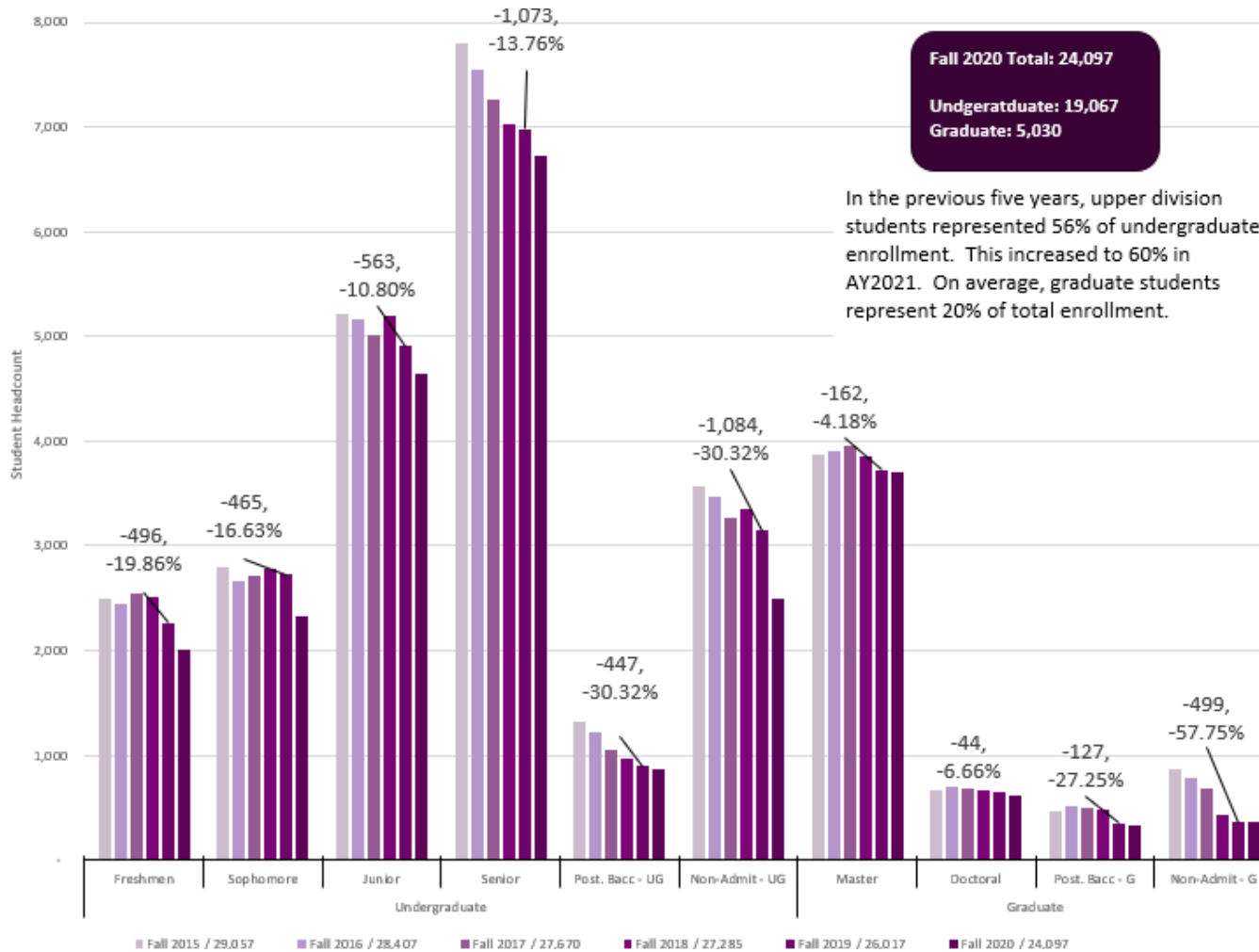
Fall Term Enrollment 1996-2020: End of Term Headcount

Enrollment: Headcount Fall 2015-2020, End of Term

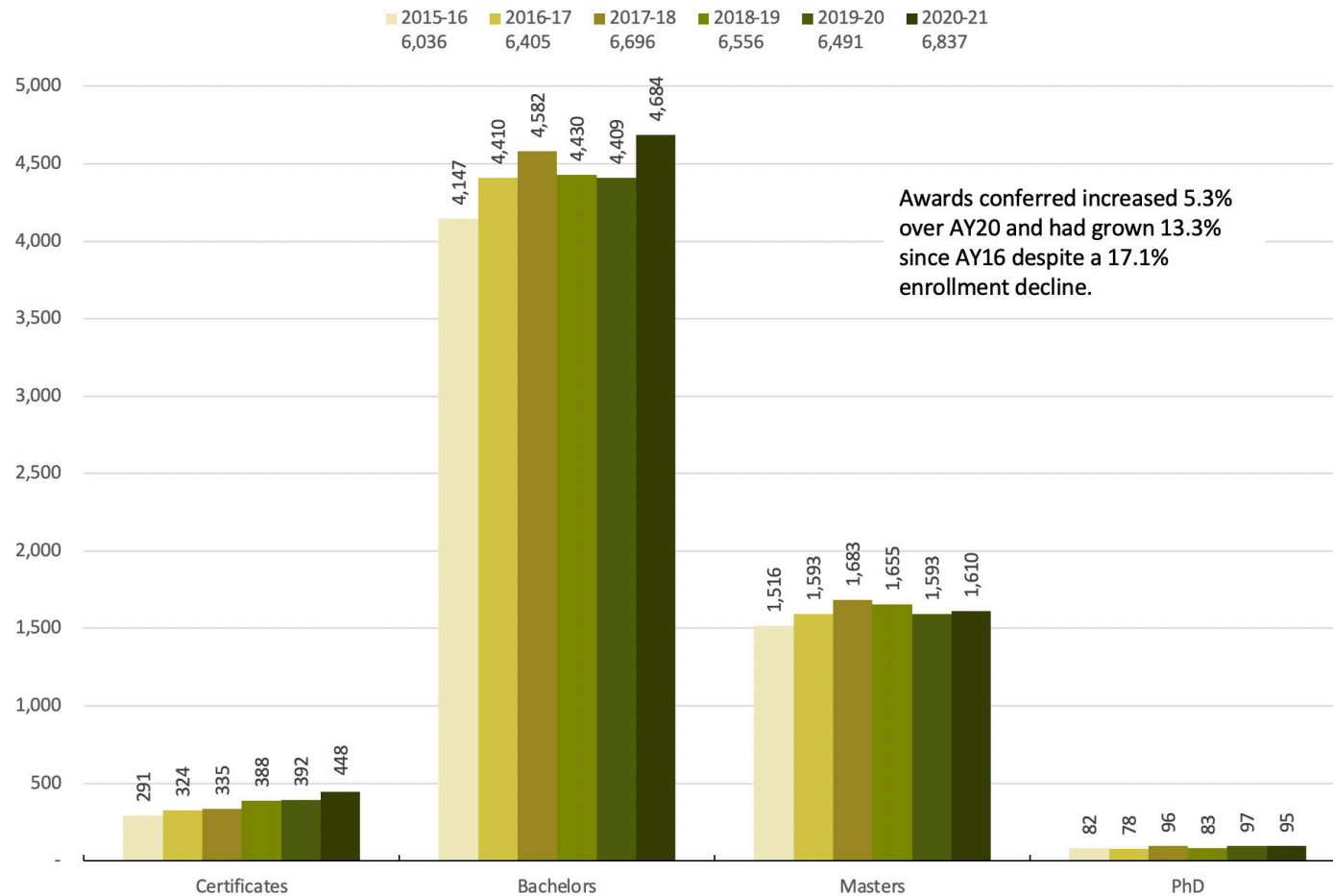

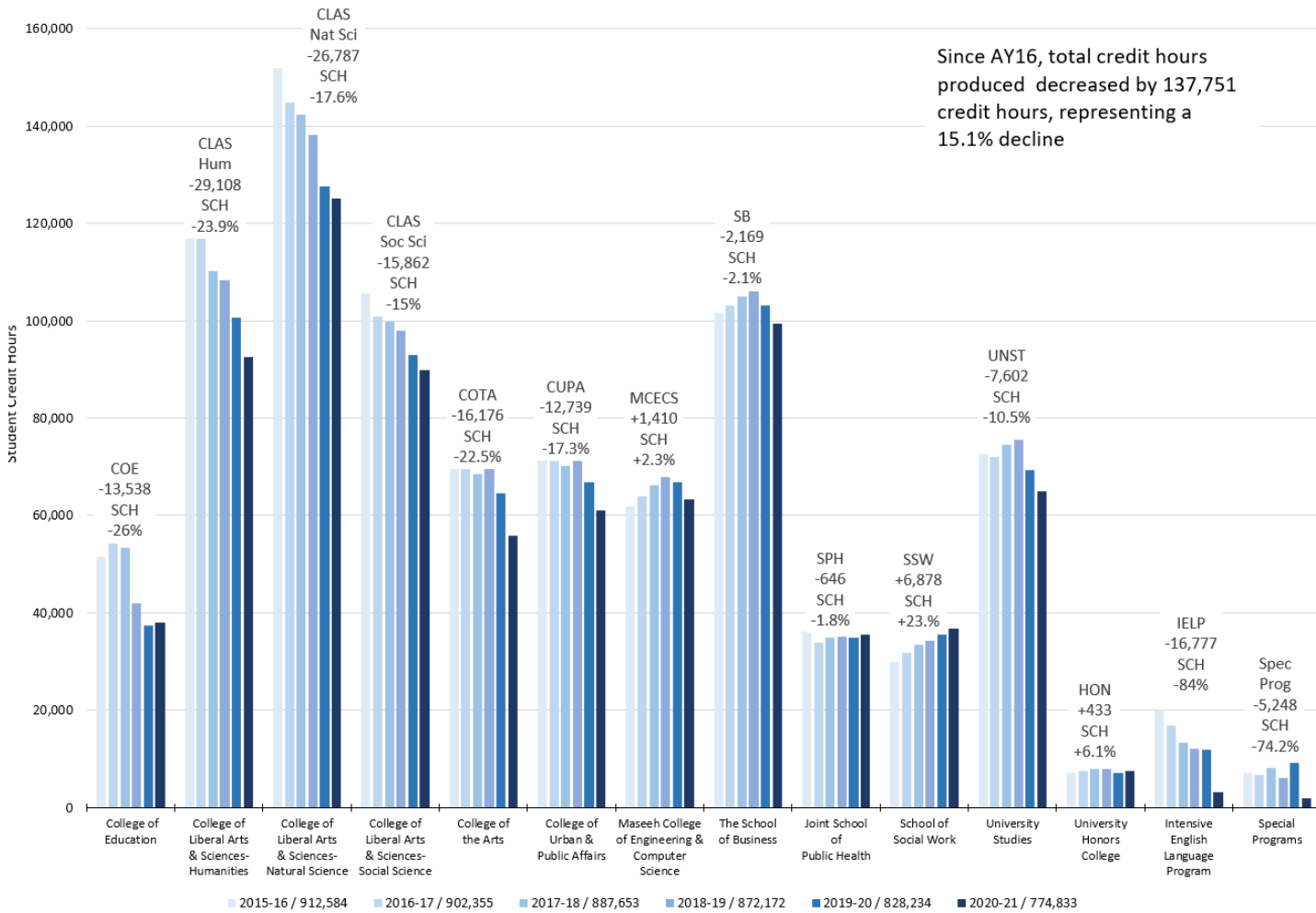

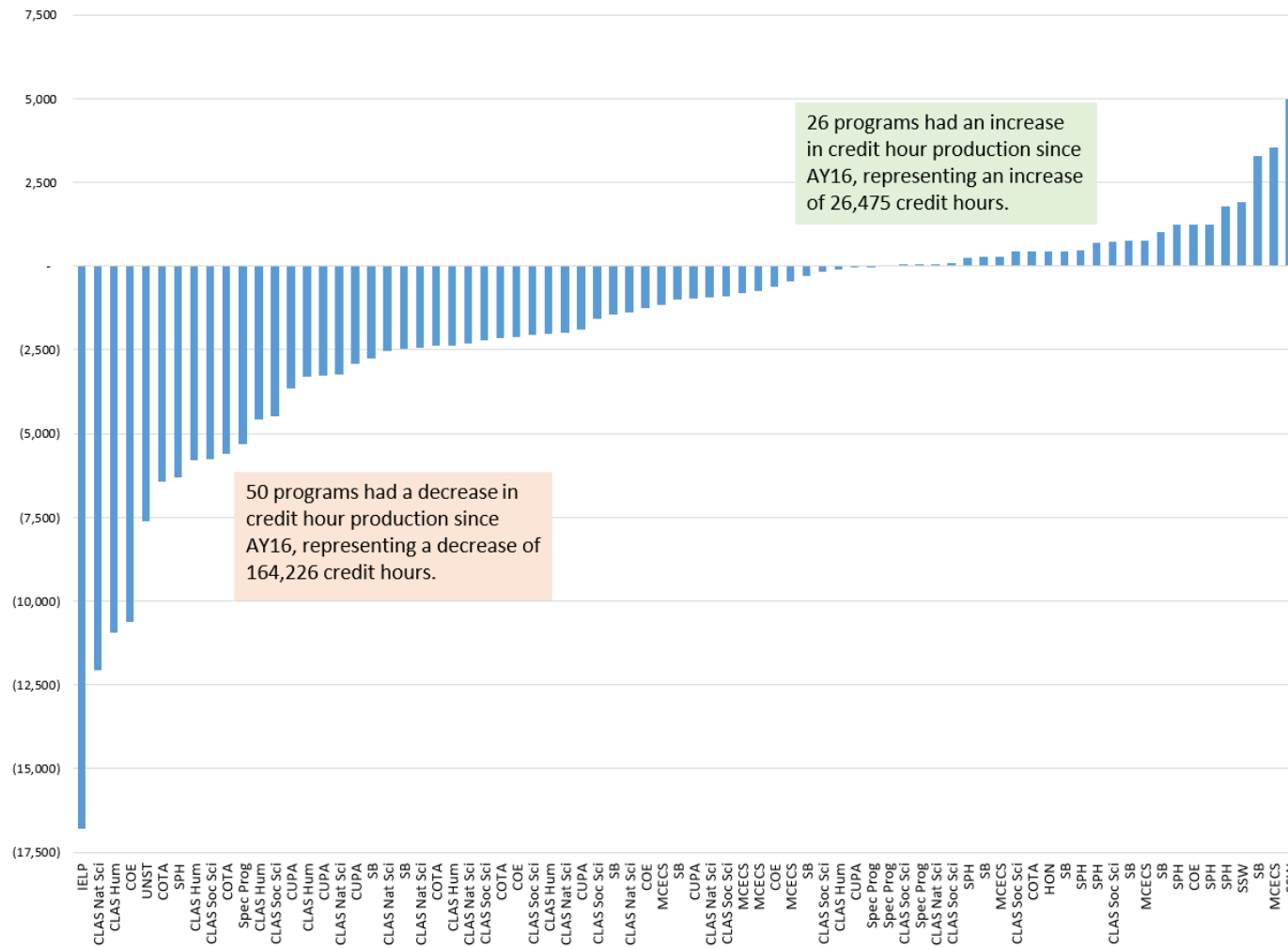
Student Credit Hours Produced AY16-21

By School/College (Nomial Change, % Change)

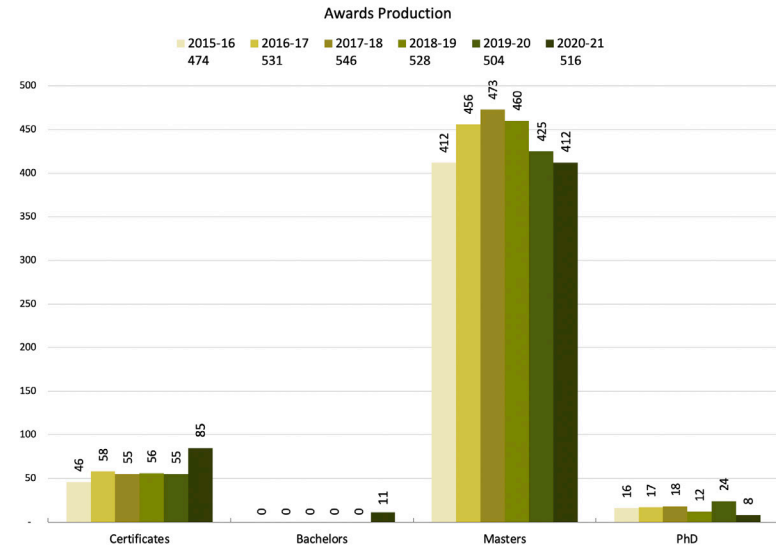
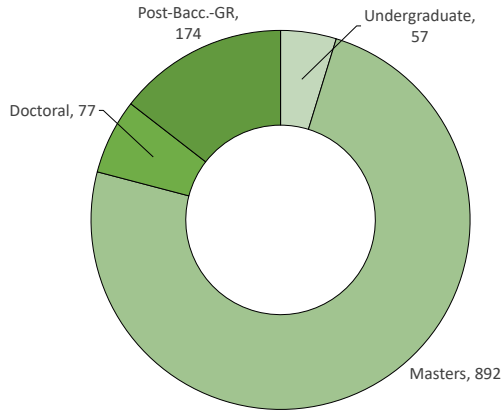


5 Year Change in Student Credit Hour Production

In FY21 CLAS conducted **\$14.3M** or **24.6%** of total university research expenditures.

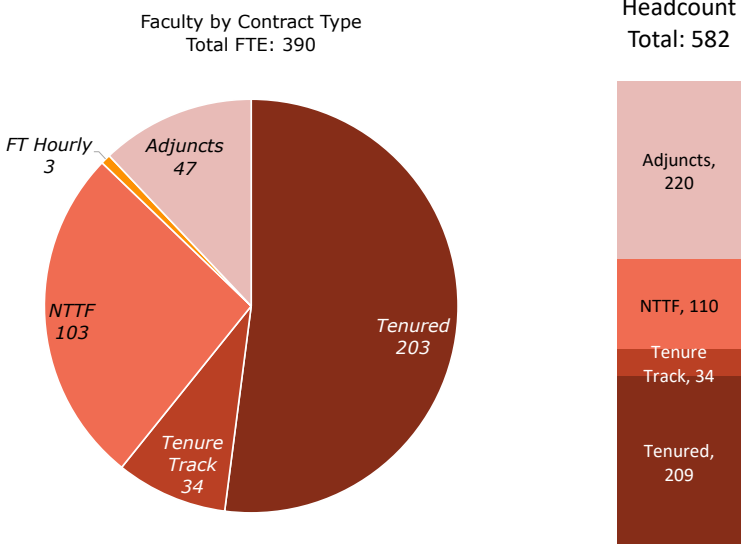
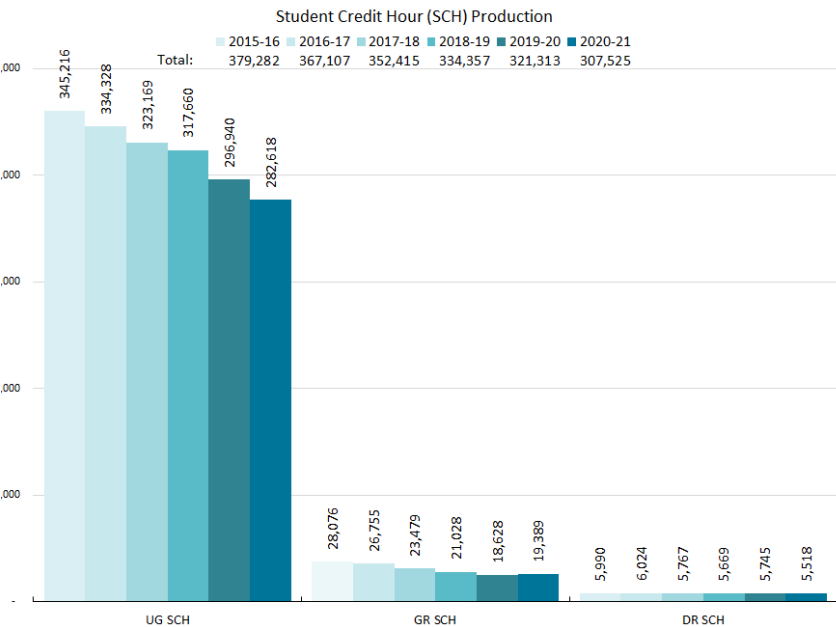

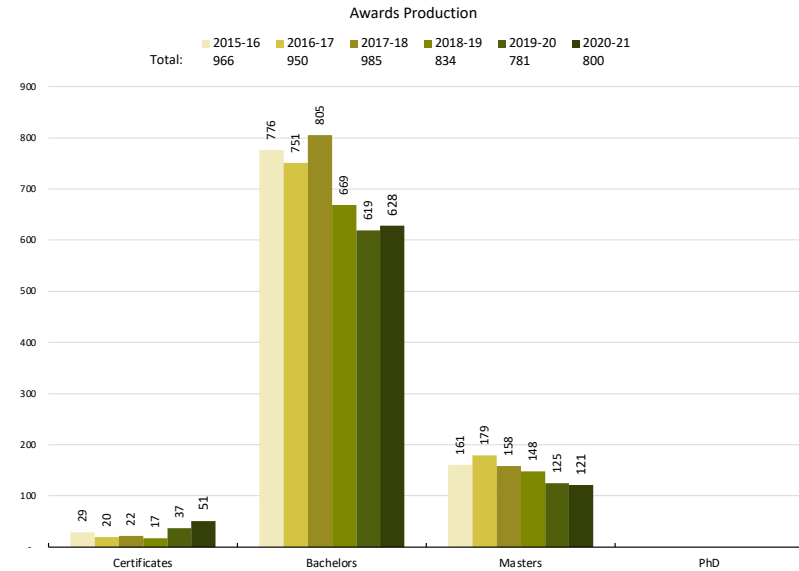

 Total FTE: 130



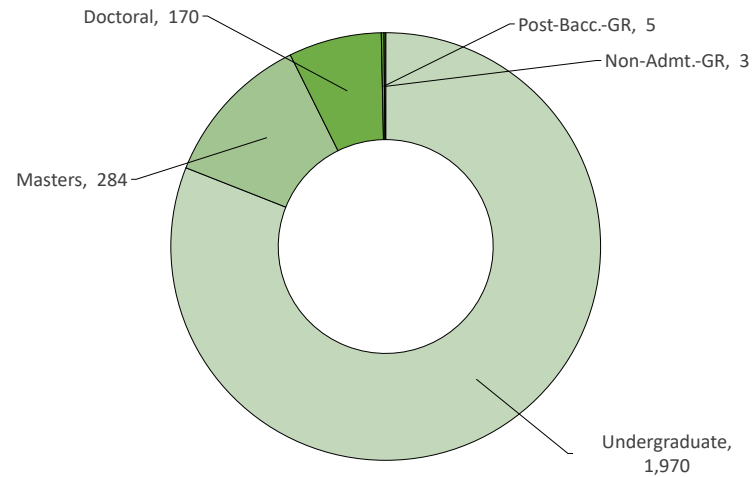

Additional Accreditations: National Association of Schools of Music (NASM), National Association of Schools of Theatre (NAST), National Architectural Accrediting Board (NAAB).

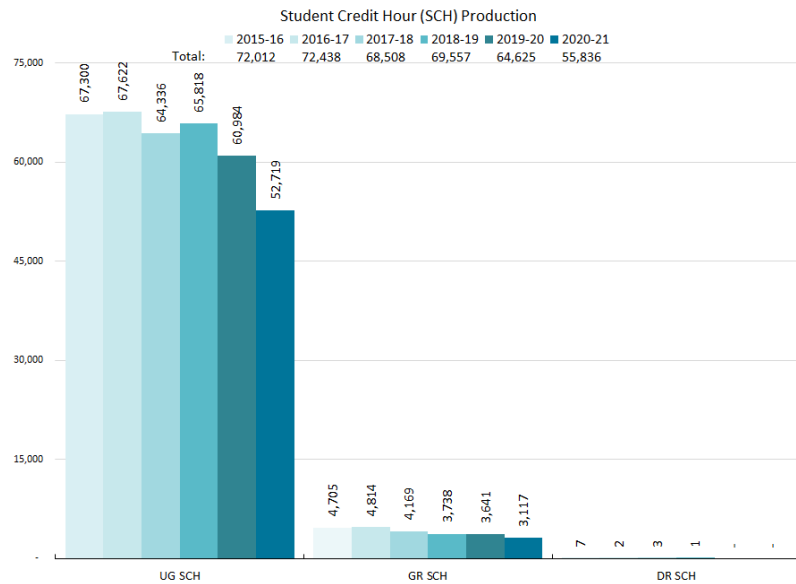

CUPA's Institute on Aging received a major philanthropic gift to expand research, education, and training related to aging services.

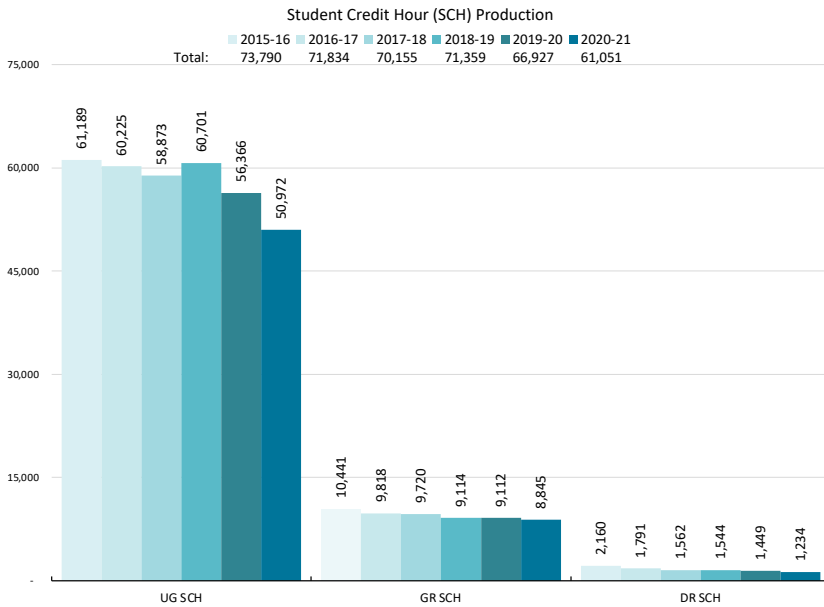
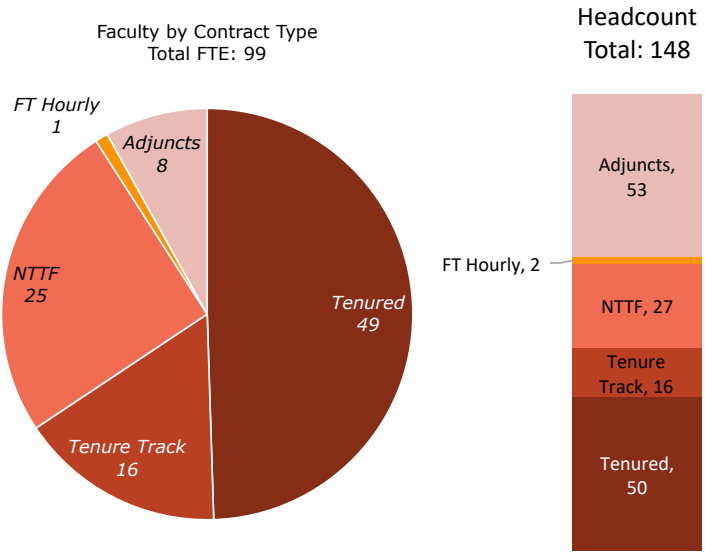

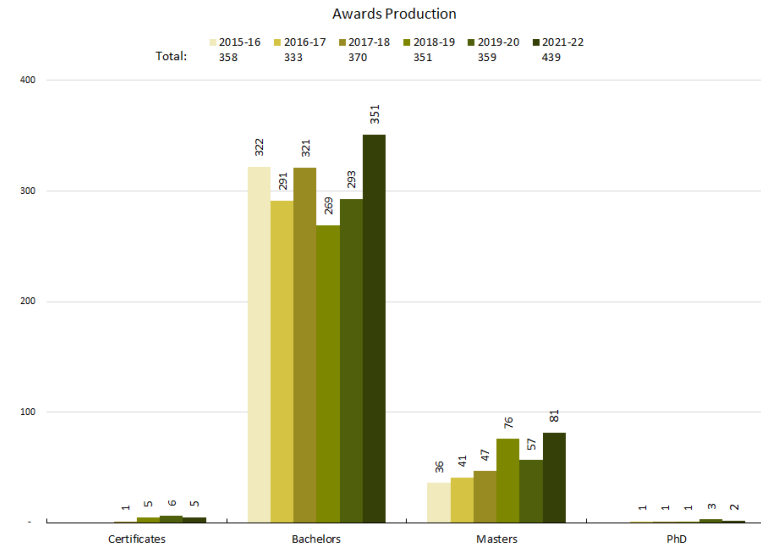
Fall 2020 Enrollment by Level: 1,487

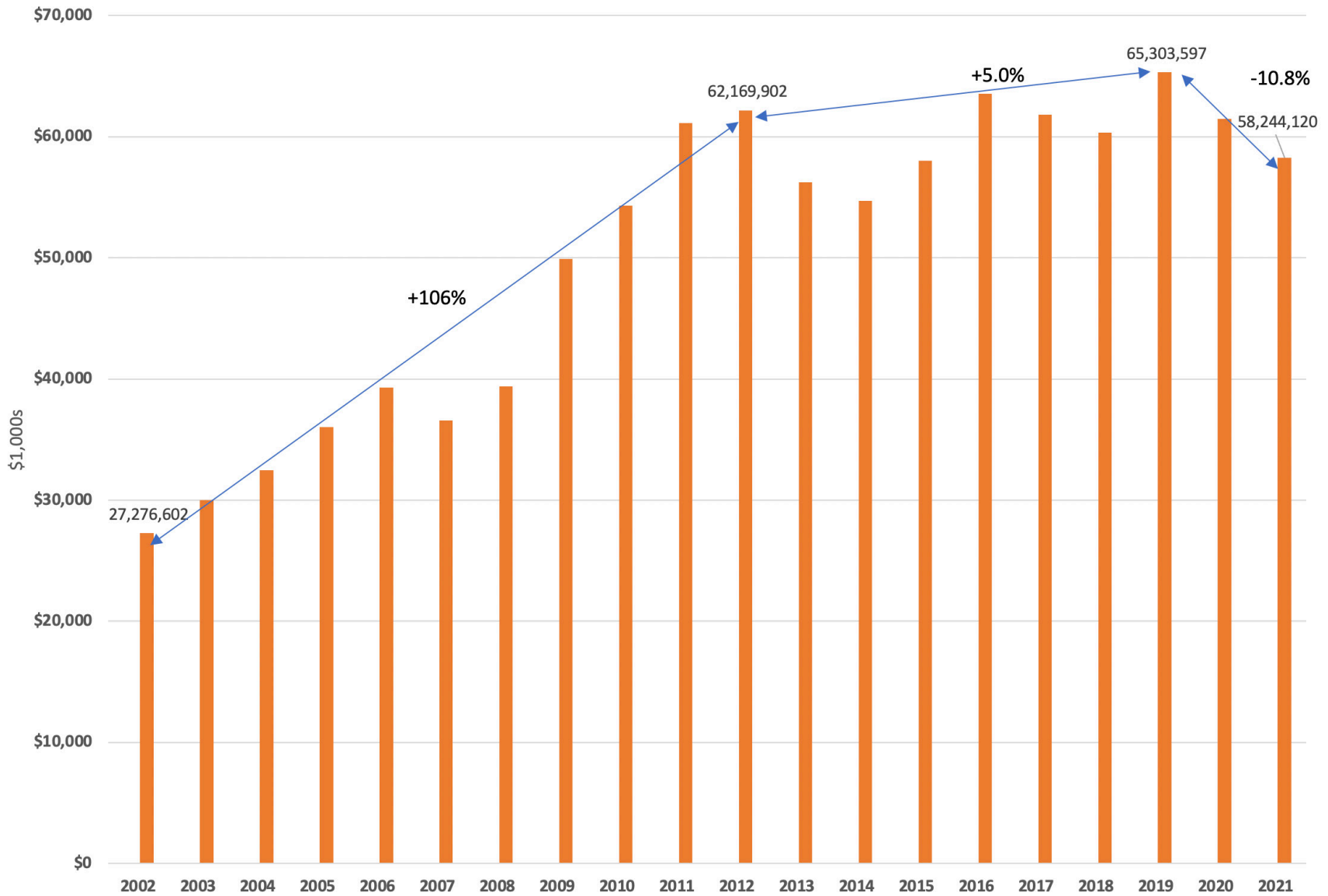

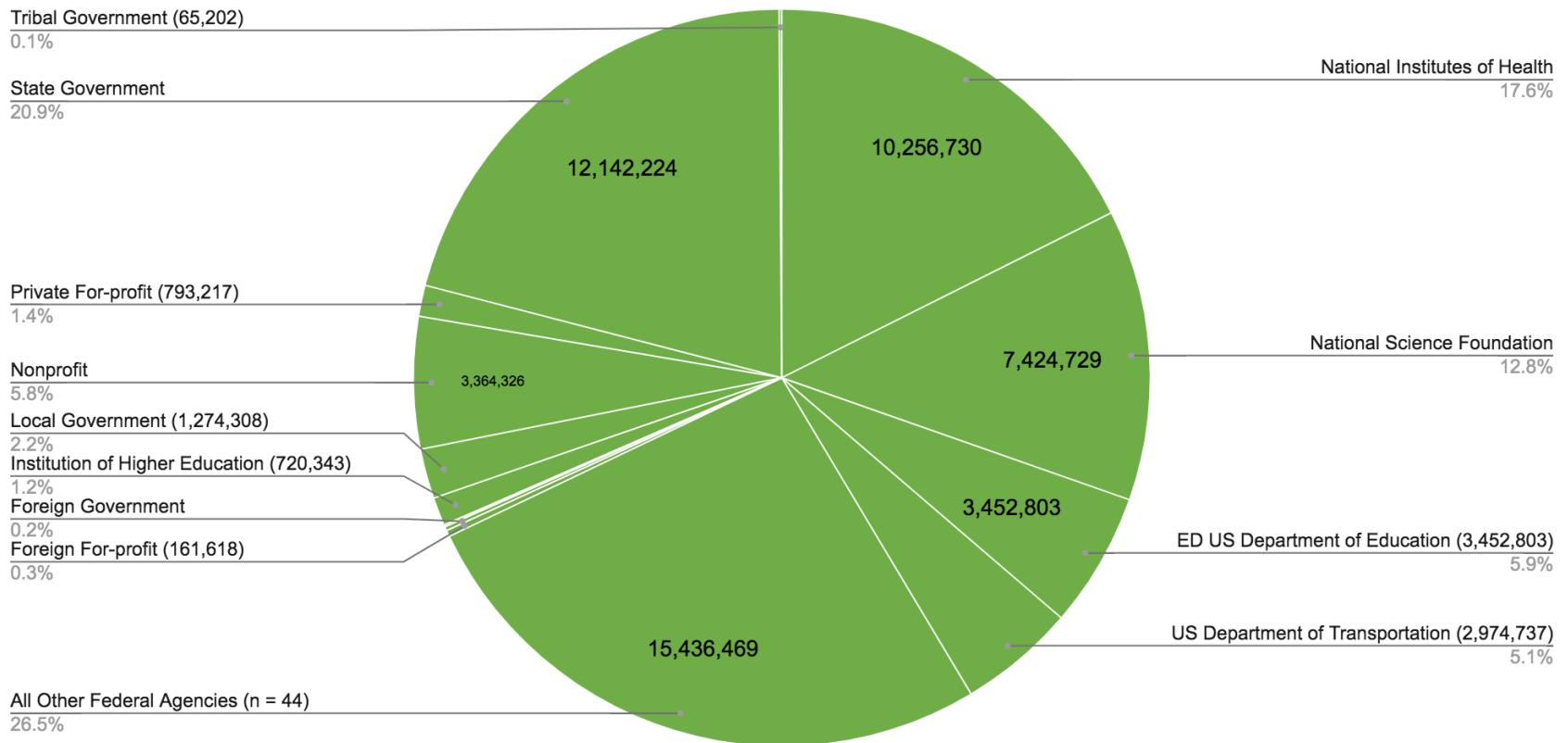
Research and Sponsored Project Expenditures

Experimental Development: Systematic work and knowledge growth gained from research and practical experience directed towards improving existing, or developing new, products or processes.

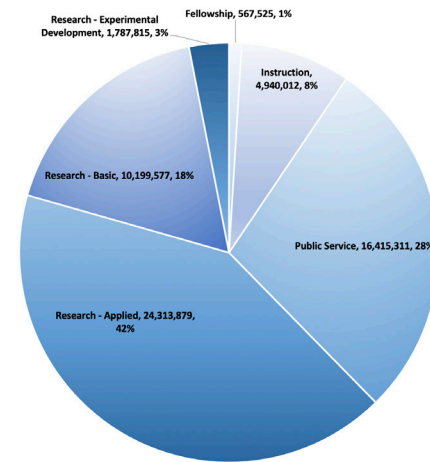

Public Service: Non-instructional delivery of professional services beneficial to individuals and groups external to the university.

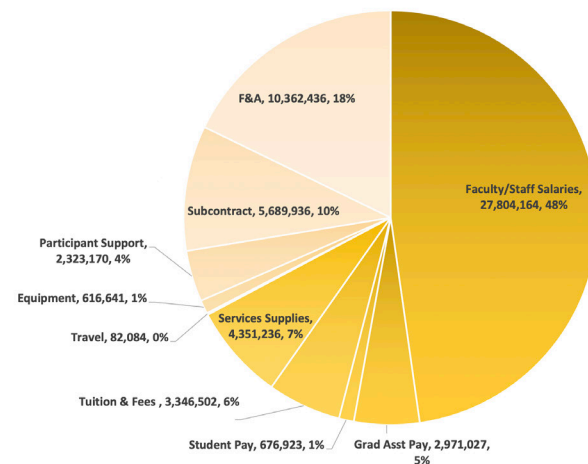
Instruction: Specific activity established by grant, contract or cooperative agreement directed to support instruction, training and curriculum development.

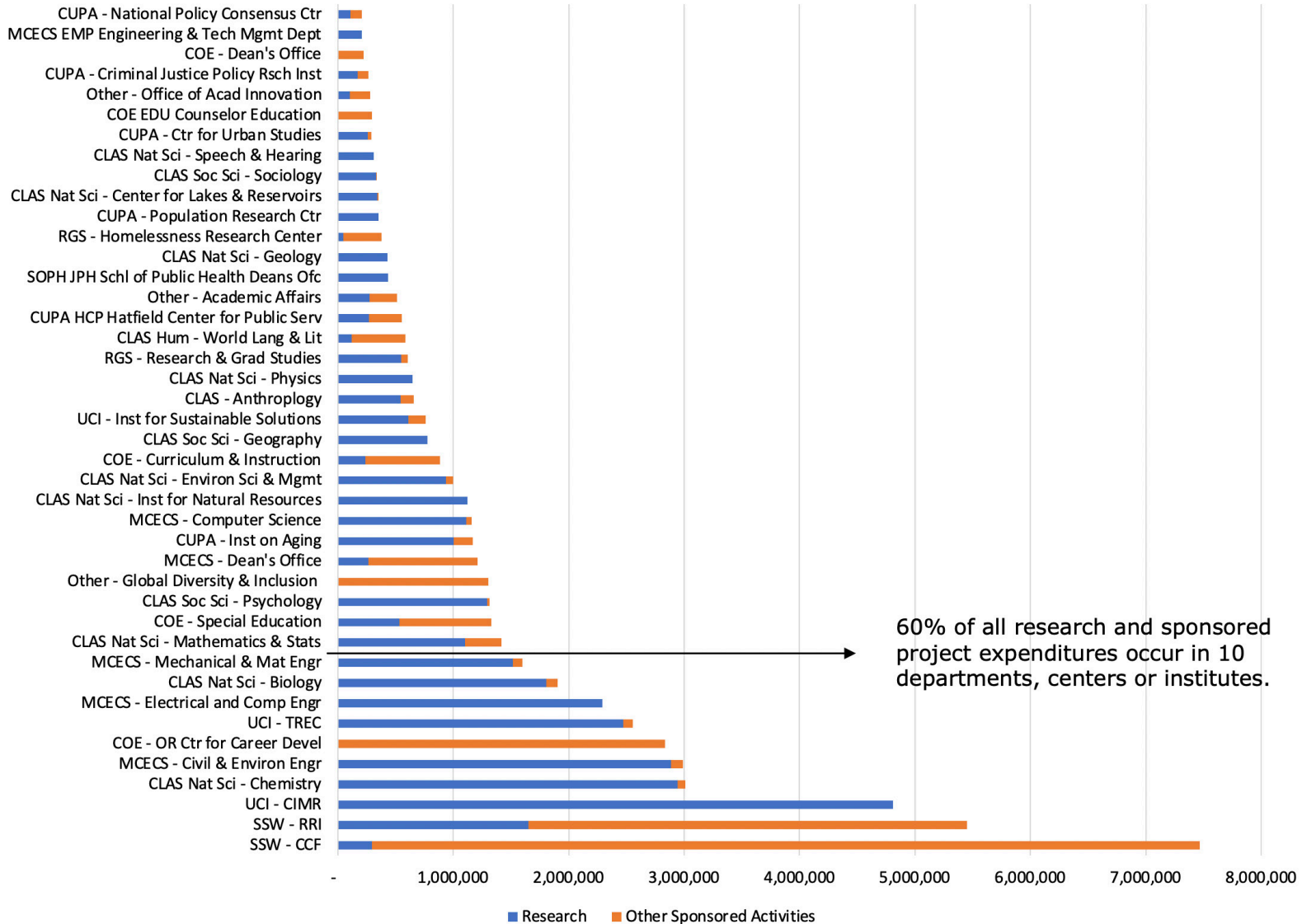

Prorated Total Research & Sponsored Project Expenditures by Department Center or Institute (N =70) Fiscal Year 2021 \$58,224,120



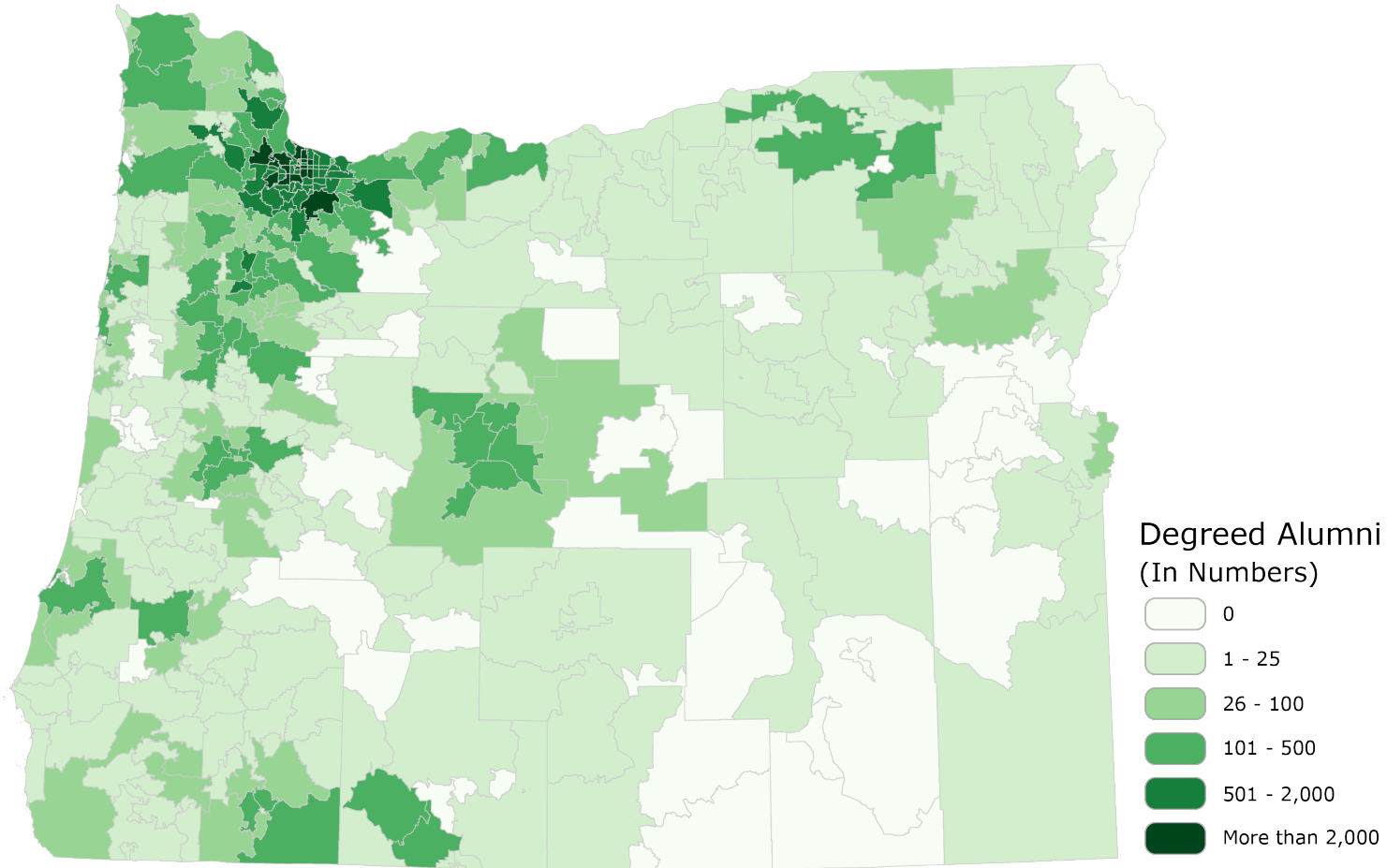
RSP by Department, Center or Institute
