**Ji Woon (June) Ryu** (with Erik Gonzalez-Mulé and Ernest O'Boyle, Indiana U). published "Taking a heavier toll? Racial differences in the effects of workplace mistreatment on depression" in *Journal of Applied Psychology*.

The article is selected as the Editor's Choice for the May 2024 issue of the journal (the Editor's Choice is an American Psychological Association initiative that the Editor-in-Chief of participating journals select one article based on societal relevance, practical implications, and/or the potential for moving our science in new directions.

Abstract: Previous studies have found that workplace mistreatment positively relates to depression, a critical mental health disorder. However, it is unknown whether mistreatment affects all individuals' depressive symptoms equally. Drawing from the hopelessness theory of depression and the stigma literature, we suggest that Blacks suffer from greater depression than Whites when they experience similar levels of workplace mistreatment because Blacks, as members of a racial minority group, are more likely to attribute workplace mistreatment to their race. This, in turn, causes them to make a pessimistic attribution (i.e., attributions that are internal, stable, and global) about themselves that, ultimately, leads to depression. We tested these predictions across two studies. In Study 1, we used a multiyear time-lagged design and multiple indicators of depression (i.e., self-reported clinical depression scale, device-traced sleep quantity, and self-reported sleep quality) and found that the positive relationship between workplace mistreatment and depression was stronger for Blacks than Whites, and that these patterns were consistent across the various indicators (although only results with the clinical depression scale and sleep quantity were statistically significant). In Study 2, we found that the influence of workplace mistreatment on depression is partly due to racial differences in how workplace mistreatment is attributed. We conclude by discussing the theoretical and practical implications of these findings and directions for future research.

**Scott DuHadway** (with Craig Carter and Renae Rockwood, Arizona State U., Pankaj Patel, Villanova U., Daniel Bachrach, U. Alabama, Elliot Bendoly, The Ohio State U., and Lutz Kaufmann, WHU-Otto Beisheim School of Management, Germany) published "Experiments in supply chain management research: A systematic review and future directions" in *Journal of Business Logistics*.

Abstract: The supply chain management discipline has seen a tremendous growth in the use of experimental methods. Given the large number of published studies, the time seems opportune to systematically review the use of such approaches. In this note, we consider multiple dimensions of experimental design used in articles published in six of our premier journals. We present these findings and contemplate opportunities for future applications of experimental methods. In particular, we highlight a need to more regularly conduct and report on the results of power analyses and experimental checks, more carefully contemplate the justification and use of WEIRD (Western, educated, industrial, rich, and democratic) participants, develop and test mediated theoretical models, and increase our focus on teams as the unit of analysis when using experimental methods.
