

## Bienvenue en FR 203

In light of the ongoing COVID 19 outbreak, this course will be taught remotely. This program is the “remote” version of our regular Face to Face class. To ensure that you can all fully participate and access the materials whenever you can, this course will be asynchronous. Assignments will be due on Sundays and Wednesdays at 23:59 so plan your study schedule accordingly. Plan on a minimum of 8 hours for this class (3h15 of usual F2F class time + study time).

### Principles

1. Nobody signed up for this.
  - Not for the sickness, not for the social distancing, not for the sudden end of our collective lives together on campus
  - Not for an online class, not for teaching remotely, not for learning from home, not for mastering new technologies, not for varied access to learning materials
2. The humane option is the best option.
  - We are going to prioritize supporting each other as humans
  - We are going to prioritize simple solutions that make sense for the most
  - We are going to prioritize sharing resources and communicating clearly
3. We will foster intellectual nourishment, social connection, and personal accommodation.

5. We will remain flexible and adjust to the situation.
  - Nobody knows where this is going and what we’ll need to adapt
  - Everybody needs support and understanding in this unprecedented moment

Welcome to Second Year French at Portland State University. French 203 is the last of a series of three French courses at Portland State University and assumes some knowledge of the language (One year of French at the university level). French 203 is a four-skills language class, i.e. it emphasizes listening, speaking, reading, and writing French in a communicative environment.

### What will I be able to do at the end of FR 203?



**Develop and implement** successful language learning skills and strategies

**Communicate** more effectively in written and spoken French : Talk about and make future plans, Give directions, Command someone to do something, Talk about hypothetical situations, Make comparisons)

**Discuss and compare** my own and other's cultural and social perspectives relative to the notions of education, life majors milestones and urban life

**Learn** to connect and work with others to achieve a set task

## What do I need for this class?

Not all versions of the textbook are available through all vendors. NOTE: Students are advised to use caution if they are purchasing an *En Avant!* "Connect" access code from a third-party vendor.
- A Connect Access Code (only if you did not buy it for FR 201). This is your online workbook to complete your homework assignments. You will access Connect for the first time by clicking on the link posted in your course Calendar posted on D2L under Content. ## What do I need to do to succeed in this class?

### #1 Participate! (25%)

This class is asynchronous which means that we will not all be online at the same time. That does not mean we will not be able to interact together, on the contrary, you will be asked to participate in our



weekly VoiceThreads. Voicethread is a learning tool that we have selected to communicate online. With VoiceThread, you will be able to create, share, and comment on images, Microsoft PowerPoint presentations, videos, audio files, documents, and PDFs, using a microphone, webcam. Every week on Sundays and Wednesdays at 9pm, a new VoiceThread will be posted. You will be asked to actively participate. You will interact with me and your classmates. Two of your lowest grades will be dropped.

## **#2 Complete your daily assignments/ Homework on time (20%)**

Each week, new assignments will be posted on Wednesdays and Sundays at 5pm. Go to the week number, and there will be two due dates each week, one on Sunday 23:59 and another one on Wednesday 23:59. Organize your study sessions accordingly. Expect a workload of about 7 hours every week (which is the equivalent of 3h “class time” and 4 hours study time). Studying is essential to your success and participation in class. All assignments in your online workbook Connect are to be completed by the due date. Late work will not be accepted. There will be no extra credits. However, to allow for unexpected events, four of your lowest grades will be dropped.

You will write two short essays. You will receive feedback from your instructor and you will then correct and rewrite a second version of your essay. Both versions will receive a grade, the second version grade based on the changes you have made.
