# In a new study led by PSU researchers, Olympia oysters in Coos and Netarts bays were found to contain a cocktail of pharmaceuticals and other potentially harmful chemicals—including pain relievers,

antibiotics, antihistamines, PCBs, mercury and pesticides. The chemicals enter the bays via groundwater runoff and wastewater that's discharged to inland rivers. The research team—which includes Environmental Science and Management Associate Professor and ISS Fellow Elise Granek and researchers from partner organizations—found that individual concentrations of chemicals are within the safe levels designated by the Oregon Health Authority; however, the health risks of consuming seafood that contains a combination of these chemicals are unknown, as are the ecological effects.
