Campus Wi-Fi upgrade

Office of Information Technology's Networking and Telecommunication Systems teams are wrapping up the final stages of a campus Wi-Fi system upgrade. The upgrade, which began in June 2013, has focused on the introduction of new controllers and access points throughout common areas and classrooms across the University, but did not include campus residential housing facilities. More than 350 older access points have been upgraded to the newer 802.11n Wi-Fi standard, which is capable of client connections up to five times faster than the previous version. **READ MORE**
