

- 1. Holly Lawson and Amy Parker, education faculty, obtained a \$1.22 million federal grant from the U.S. Department of Education's Office of Special Education Programs. The five-year grant for the Interdisciplinary Distance Educators Advancing Low-Incidence Students (IDEALS) project will support College of Education graduate students' tuition and teach them how to best provide distance learning in science, technology, engineering and math to students with visual loss, including those with additional disabilities.
- 2. Mary Morningstar, education faculty, is one of the co-principal investigators for a \$4.01 million grant to expand services for students and youth with disabilities through the National Technical Assistance Center on Transition (NTACT). NTACT is a partnership of organizations, including PSU's Transition Coalition. The new five-year grant will help NTACT provide technical assistance and training to state education and vocational rehabilitation agencies focused on the transition from school to adulthood for youths with disabilities.
