## PSU, open for all

Portland State has extended a helping hand to high school seniors affected by the pandemic's disruptions by waiving application fees, temporarily lowering GPA requirements, and providing a Summer Bridge program to help prepare selected incoming students for college. The University also will provide on-campus housing discounts for qualified low-income students and expand eligibility for the Four Years Free program. ## Portland State plans for an in-person fall term

In a <u>letter to campus</u>, President Stephen Percy announced that spring and summer terms will be mostly remote with an expectation that the University will reunite for primarily in-person instruction fall term. Fall plans will follow public health guidance for social distancing, gathering size, mask-wearing and airflow. More details about how employees and students will be brought back to campus safely will be shared in the coming months.

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
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## **CURRENTLY ACCOLADES: GRANTS FOR FEBRUARY 1, 2021**
