Portland State University Economics Department Seminar (1 credit per term)

Economics majors, graduate students and other students currently enrolled in an economics course may earn one credit per term for enrollment in the PSU Economics Department Seminar. There is no limit to the number of terms for which students may enroll in the Economics Seminar; however only 4 credits of seminar may be applied toward an undergraduate economics major or minor. Economics graduate students are expected to enroll in the seminar, and may apply up to 4 credits toward the master's degree.

The seminars will be presented by PSU faculty, faculty from other academic institutions, or other professional economists, and from a variety of approaches and on a wide range of topics. Students will therefore be exposed to the breadth of economics in practice at an advanced level, rather than the coherent study of a particular field or topic.

Undergraduates will be required to:

- attend all seminars
- submit a 1-page summary and discussion of four seminars, to be turned in within 7 days of the seminar, using Canvas for the corresponding seminar. Please submit in Word format.

Graduate students will be required to:

- attend all seminars
- submit a 2-page summary and discussion of four seminars that draws on your broader knowledge of economics, using Canvas for the corresponding seminar.
 Please submit in Word format.

Student papers will be evaluated by both the substance and accuracy of their

description of the research project presented, the centrality of the issues discussed, the strength of the connections made to economics course material assigned in other classes and the sophistication of discussion with respect to the analytical strategies of the researcher, as well as the clarity, coherence and flow of the writing. Expectations for graduate students, particularly those pursuing graduate work in Economics, shall be markedly higher than for undergraduates.

Should circumstances arise that prevent a student from attending one of the scheduled seminars, please contact me to discuss a possible alternative arrangement.
