## Portland metro area school administrators and PSU College of Education discuss ways of addressing potential teacher shortage

Portland metro area school district administrators shared solutions such as university partnerships, inhouse teacher prep programs and national searches to solve a potential statewide teacher shortage that could result from the Student Success Act.

The Oregon Legislature passed the Student Success Act earlier this year, which boosts spending on schools, with an additional \$1 billion disbursing to school districts in fall of 2020. Legislators earmarked the funds for areas such as hiring teachers and cultural responsiveness.

The funding benefits schools, but it could intensify the effects of a teacher shortage, according to Portland metro area school district officials, because the legislation allocates funds for all 197 school districts in the state to hire teachers. <u>Read more</u>.
