I. Critical Approaches and Methods (8 credits)

These courses reinforce skills essential for upper-division studies in English literature and language: close reading of literary form and genre, rhetorical analysis, research methods, and argumentative writing. Two to three 200-level English courses are the expected preparation for both ENG 300 and WR 301.

Take both courses, ideally in consecutive terms. Both courses are offered every term:

____ WR 301 Critical Writing in English (*required before or along with 400-level ENG courses*)

II. Historical Literacy (8 credits)

These courses provide students with the opportunity to explore different historical periods, regions, and genres, thus enabling them to find connections between multiple topics and cultural moments.

Important notes/Frequently asked questions:

Grades: All courses used for the English major must be taken for a letter grade (not pass/no pass) and students must earn a C or higher (courses graded C- and lower will not count in the major).

Topics course restriction: Topics courses may be repeated for credit if the topic is different, but only up to 8 credits of each course will apply to the ENG major.

Sequence courses: Students are encouraged but not required to take sequence courses (I, II, III) in sequence. For example, ENG 254 American Literature II can be taken before ENG 253 American Literature I. Part I will just focus on earlier works in literature than part II.

Advanced topics courses: Advanced topics courses do not require prior coursework in that topic. For example, ENG 343U Romanticism is not required before ENG 458 Adv. Topics in Romanticism.

Alternative electives: LING 390 or WLL 390 may be used as an English major elective. One 300- or 400-level literature course from the WLL department may count with adviser approval.

Course restrictions: 200-level WR courses and WR 323 will not count in the English major. No more than 12 credits taken for the minor in Writing may be applied to the English major.

Residency: A minimum of 28 credits for the English major must be taken at PSU.
