Meet a C-GEO TC

This issue's feature is about C-GEO TC Dan Rideout.

Tell us about yourself.

I am currently a special education teacher at Jefferson Middle School. I work with 8 students in a life skills setting. I began teaching in 1992, starting at a small private school where I had the keys to the activity bus, and we used it on a regular basis to explore the community. We took hikes in the forests, different parks and beaches, museums and even a trip to watch a fire team put out a fire (from a safe distance) in our school's neighborhood.

What has drawn you to geography education?

For years my wife and I take three annual trips a year: one in-state; one somewhere in the USA; and one trip to a foreign country. Each day on these trips includes an outdoor explore early in the morning, an educational or

"must do" activity or experience, and an effort in the evening to connect with locals at an eatery. As an individual goal for each trip we take, I make a journey to "the" high point with a view of the area. Sometimes it's a manmade structure (think Space Needle) other times there is a small mountain or a big hill to climb for the sunrise vista.

Ever since I started journeying out of the State of Maine as a college student I knew that I wanted to see as much of the world as possible. I attended Maine Maritime Academy to play football and find work on the ocean to get to see more of the world. That idea quickly turned when the US Merchant Marine collapsed in 1982. Only the top 10 students would find jobs sailing under a USA flag; that was not me. I pivoted and became an officer in the US Navy. Wow! What an adventure. I sailed more than the seven seas: up and down the West Coast of the USA, to European ports in Spain, Portugal, England, Scotland, Norway, France, Italy, into the Indian Ocean, a stop in the Philippines, Singapore, Kenya, and Australia.

The C-GEO Institute for educators is awesome. Having the opportunity to explore the most sought after places in the world for an extended period of time is a dream come true. Passionate geography professors leading us while we collect experiences and materials to create geography lesson plans for the curricular spectrum of Oregon's classrooms is a serious bonus.

How are you promoting geography education in the classroom and beyond?

I have been promoting C-GEO to my peers since 2005, and made use of the C-GEO Grants at Salem-Keizer Schools, Scio School District, and Jefferson School District. I was awarded money to create a Family Geography Night at Houck Middle School; it was such a hit! Students took their parents around the campus to a variety of activities related to geography, including the "huge" Oregon floor map, placing dots on the places you've lived, places you visited and places you want to go. I was awarded money to purchase a class set of GPS handheld navigation devices, which were used by the science department and the cross country team. I am currently working with two other TCs at Jefferson Middle

School to enhance the library collection with 90 books pertaining to geography. There is an incentive for students to select a book, complete a series of "book reports" that are formatted to address Oregon State Geography Standards. Students keep track of the geography books they've read with a "passport" and receive a customs stamp for each book they've read and earn a series of awards for completing the book reports. I actually just finished presenting this incentive to all of the 6th graders, and I was very pleased to see their excitement to check out a book and plan which of the 3 "book reports" they would use and which incentive they wanted the most.

What have you enjoyed about C-GEO?

I have enjoyed everything about being involved with C-GEO: making new and lasting connections with fellow teachers throughout the state of Oregon; exploring parts of the world I could never imagine doing without the financial support of the Gray Family Grant and the leadership of Ken and Nancee; and taking a deep dive into the geography standards with fellow educators and then finding ways to create lesson plans in every discipline within the academic spectrum.

I need to take a moment to thank Nick Clawson for introducing me to C-GEO way back in 2005. It's been a wonderful journey and I hope there are more adventures to come.
