MEMORY CARE COMMUNITIES IN OREGON

Provide a secured environment for persons with dementia. Services include daily meals and snacks, 24-hour staff, assistance with personal care, health monitoring and supervision, psycho-social support, medication administration, and care coordination.

The Oregon Department of Human Services licenses and monitors MCCs.

There were 148 memory care communities licensed as assisted living or residential care, with a capacity for 5,074 residents in 2014.






