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CAMPUS PUBLIC SAFETY REPORT

Introduction:

This is the fifth report related to the deployment of Portland State University Campus Police Officers on July 1, 2015. This report will cover developments and activities from January, 2017 to November, 2017.

Operations:

From January through November of this year, CPS officers have worked 1429 hours of overtime. This overtime was necessary to maintain 24/7 coverage and increase safety during scheduled and unscheduled events. In addition, these hours reflect the commitment to having two (2) police officers on campus during all shifts.

Officers Patrick Dewey, Chris Fischer-Williams, and Matthew Masunari graduated from the basic Academy this year. All three are now working independently of their Field Training Officers, working toward competing their probationary status by the middle of next year.

We are currently in the process of hiring one campus dispatcher which will bring us up to full strength with six campus dispatchers. Campus Dispatchers have taken part in monthly PSU Alert drills with our University Emergency Manager to ensure a smooth delivery of messages when necessary.

During the months of October and November, Public Safety Officers were assigned to a fixed position detail at the University Place Hotel in an effort to reduce and deter criminal activity. The assignment was successful in that only one reported car prowler took place during the two months.

Internship Program:

The CPSO intern program was created August of 2016 with the collaboration of PSU's Department of Criminology & Criminal Justice. CPSO has provided thirteen students with internships since the creation of the program. Interns are exposed to ride-a-longs with Campus Public Safety, Portland Police Bureau, Gresham Police Department and other local police departments. Interns are exposed to the daily operations of CPSO, criminal court trials as well as tours and opportunities to speak with Multnomah County District Attorney Office. Many of our former interns are currently seeking employment in Law Enforcement.

Thirteen student interns have completed the program to date. We have two students scheduled for 2018 winter term and one student scheduled for 2018 spring term.

Training:

Campus Police Officers have attended 893 total hours of training from January, 2017 to November, 2017. Training includes, but is not limited to; Investigations, CPR/First Aid, Verbal De-escalation, Less Lethal, Firearms, Policies and Procedures, Media Interviews, Forensic Video, Field Training, Micro Aggression, Tactical Medicine, Crisis Intervention, Sexual Assault Investigation (SATF), and ATAP Threat Assessment.

It should be noted these hours do not reflect a monthly training session with SHAC which provides for case review, lessons learned and communication skills, which are mentored by Mental Health Professionals. Officer participation varies with call load and shift assignment.

The following data documents those areas of training deemed necessary and important for all police officers to receive. It has been included to show the number of hours received and who provided the training. The Police Officer Training Table provides the dates officers received the training. There are several 2018 dates listed for officers, reflecting the on-going commitment to ensure all officers receive these important trainings. All officers are projected to be in compliance with the listed training by the end of 2018.

Use of Force:

4K 2017-299

On 03-26-17, Campus Police Officers attempted to contact an occupied vehicle on the roof of Structure Three relative to a Public Indecency investigation. Ignoring the commands of the officers, the driver of the vehicle aggressively reversed out of a parking space, went forward at a high rate of speed and left the structure. One officer feared the moving vehicle would

strike the other officer, drew his duty weapon thus pointing it at the vehicle. The officer did not discharge his weapon.

The Use of Force Investigation found the officer's actions to be outside Policy *300.4.1 Shooting at or From a Moving Vehicles*. The event was debriefed with Command Staff and remedial training was conducted regarding the policy and decision making.

4K 2017-926

On 08-18-17, Campus Police Officers attempted to make a drug arrest adjacent to Stott Center. Officers drew Tasers and issued commands to suspects who eventually complied. One suspect was taken into custody. The officer did not discharge the Taser.

The use of force investigation found the officer's actions to be outside of Policy *390.5.1 Taser*. Officers received remedial training in Taser, to maintain their certification. In addition, the event was de-briefed with command staff, with officers receiving additional remedial training in the policy and procedures.

4K 2017-1205

On 10-30-17, Campus Police Officers responded to assist Portland Police Bureau (PPB) Officers, who were attempting to take a wanted person into custody on the east side of the Engineering Building. The person ran from PPB and Campus Police used an approved apprehension technique to facilitate the custody. Campus Police actions were within the guidelines of Policy *300.3.1 Use of Force* and *ORS 161.235*.

Personnel Complaints:

There were no Personnel Complaints received during this reporting period.

Cases of Note:

Since being trained on administering NARCAN to overdosing community members, Campus Police Officers have successfully reversed three overdose incidents. Two of these incidents occurred off campus grounds, with a single incident on campus. In addition, Campus Police Officer supplied two NARCAN doses to Portland Police Bureau Officers for their application, on property adjacent to the University.

Through the summer of 2017, two CPSO Officers became familiar with two houseless students who had plans to start school in September of 2017. Both were in different stages. One planned to continue their education but was having difficulty getting back into things while the other had already been accepted into a graduate program starting September 2017.

By happenstance, both students met during this trying time. While working full-time jobs during the day they took turns sleeping at night while to protect each other.

The Officers were able to provide resources to the students. As of November, both students are doing great in school, have stable living arrangements and are continuing on to be the successful young adults that the officers knew they would be.

We are now working with the Father's House City Ministries with outreach workers on the continuing homeless issue.
