- ✓ Apply the research and theoretical concepts of learning environments to individual practice through the creation of equitable policies and programs, individual and group professional development, and sustainable organizational practices.
- Effectively use oral communication, written communication, research/assessment techniques, and technology appropriate to educational practice.

Admissions

- ✓ Before applying to the PACE program you must possess a bachelor's degree from an accredited institution and have a cumulative GPA of at least 3.0 in the highest degree earned. Students must also be able to verify any undergraduate or graduate coursework.
- ✓ International students must have an official TOEFL score report sent directly to PSU Office of Admission from the Educational Testing Service (ETS). <u>You can</u> <u>check TOEFL requirements here</u>. Have the report mailed to: PSU, Office of Admissions and Records, P.O. Box 751, Portland, OR 97207
- ✓ It is a University requirement that students register and pay for at least one credit in the term they are admitted. Failure to do so will result in automatic cancellation of your admission. If you need to change the term for which you intend to begin classes after you have submitted your application, please contact the ELP department at 503-725-4633 to discuss your options.
- ✓ Students may enroll in courses prior to formal admission into the program. Preadmission credits are defined as credits taken at any institution, including PSU before the term of formal admission.

Program Information

MA/MS Degree

A Master of Arts differs from a Master of Science in that there is a second language proficiency requirement for Master of Arts degrees. You can find additional second language information <u>here</u>.

Registration

The PACE program does not require continuous registration of students. 9 credits is full-time student status, and 5 credits is part-time student status for financial aid purposes.

Required Courses

ELP Professional Studies Core (16 credits)

Students may complete the professional studies core at any point in their program. However, it is recommended that students complete ELP 520 and ELP 511 as early as possible.

Thematic specializations and electives (25 credits)

The Thematic Specializations are to serve as a learning guide in assisting students with focusing and developing their program. They are not intended to be prescriptive. As such, working with their advisor students may choose one theme or combine courses from a variety of themes.

Electives

Students may also be interested in courses offered by other PSU academic units including the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences (anthropology, sociology, psychology, philosophy—conflict management and ethics, applied linguistics, and speech communication); the College of Urban Public Affairs; and the School of Business Administration.

Credit Limitations

A maximum of 6 credits of 810 can be used towards the master's degree, however, an adviser must approve use of these credits in advance, and the courses must be taken for a letter grade. 808 credits cannot be used toward a graduate degree.

All coursework applied toward the master's degree must be letter-graded, except ELP 506: Self-Directed Learning, ELP 506: Comprehensive Examination Project, ELP 509: Internship/Practicum, and ELP 503: Thesis. These courses are only offered P/NP.

Program of Study

Complementary courses are not required and electives may be chosen outside of the theme, including outside of the ELP department.

Internship and Independent Study Guidelines

Students may work with faculty to design a self-directed learning experience. Most students engage in independent study after they have completed at least 20 credits of course work. At this point, specific learning needs and interests may be identified. Students might engage in research, program evaluation, practicum, internship, special project, or reading and conference on selected topics. ELP 506 Independent Study (1-3 credits) ELP 509 Internship/Practicum (1-4 credits)

A maximum of 6 credits of ELP 506: Self-Directed Learning and 6 credits of ELP 509: Internship/Practicum can be used toward the master's degree. Additionally, a maximum of 6 credits of ELP 501, 505, and 506 combined can be used.

Comprehensive Examination Guidelines (COMPS)

The comprehensive exam is a project-based experience that requires enrollment in ELP 507: PACE Comps (4 credits), taken as Pass/No Pass and offered every term. The project entails completion of an eportfolio that includes evidence of key learning in the program and a theory-to-practice paper. The theory-to-practice paper focuses on a problem or issue, theories related to the problem or issue, and a proposed intervention as a solution to the problem or issue.

Students should have completed a minimum of 35 credits, including the Professional Studies Core, before enrolling in the course. The ELP 507: PACE Comp course will meet 4 to 6 times during the term to help guide students through the completion of their eportfolio. Students will present their projects/paper orally in the final meeting(s) of the course. Further options and guidelines for completing the comprehensive examination process will be discussed in the class.

General Policies and Procedures

Student Progress

Students must maintain a GPA of 3.0 or better to remain in good academic standing. No more than four credits graded as "C" are allowed and must be approved for use towards a degree by your faculty advisor.

Subject to the approval of the instructor, students have a maximum of one year to remove an I (Incomplete) grade.

Any course graded M (Missing) can changed to a letter grade within one term. If the M is not changed to a grade after one term, it will become an X (No Basis for Grade), which cannot be changed to a grade at a future time. It is the student's responsibility to monitor their grades after each term and contact the instructor if there is an inconsistency.

Academic Integrity

The following constitutes conduct as proscribed by Portland State University for which a student or student organization or group is subject to disciplinary action:

(1) Obstruction or disruption of teaching, research, administration, disciplinary procedures or other University activities, including the University's public service functions or other authorized activities on University-owned or -controlled property, or any other location where teaching, research, administration, disciplinary procedures or other University activities take place.

(2) All forms of academic dishonesty, cheating, and fraud, including but not limited to: (a) plagiarism, (b) the buying and selling of course assignments and research papers, (c) performing academic assignments (including tests and examinations) for other persons, (d) unauthorized disclosure and receipt of academic information and (e) falsification of research data.

Credit for Previous Coursework/Transfer

Students may transfer credit hours into the degree program subject to approval by the department. These credits are defined as credits earned prior to admission to the PACE program.

Students are limited to 15 credits of pre-admission credits to use towards their degree. Courses must not have been used towards any other degree. Courses with grades lower than a "B" and those graded as "Pass/No Pass" are not transferable into the program.

Your advisor will be assigned upon admission and will be noted in the letter of admission you receive from the Office of Graduate Studies. While you do not need to meet with your advisor to register for courses, it is in your best interest to meet with them and get to know them. Health Insurance

PSU provides students taking 5 or more in-load, non self-support credits per term (1 credit for international students) with the mandatory PSU Student Health Insurance Plan.
