Research Interests

My research interests focus on higher education, STEM education, social class, the graduate labor market, underemployment, and the craft economy. Specifically, my thesis examines graduate underemployment and the craft economy through the lens of college-educated baristas working in Portland. For this project I am using semi-structured interviews. I am also working on two quantitative projects, both using data from the High School Longitudinal Study of 2009. The first concerns respondents' selection of and persistence with a college STEM major, predicted by parental STEM capital, and mediated by a range of achievement, attitude, and institutional factors. The second is about gender and STEM major selection and persistence.
