

MASTER OF ARTS IN WORLD LANGUAGES AND LITERATURES

The M.A. in World Languages and Literatures is a graduate degree with concentrations in a primary language, a secondary language, and linguistics. The primary language may be French, German, Japanese or Spanish. The secondary language may be Arabic, Chinese, French, German, Japanese, Russian or Spanish.

Admission to the Program: Applicants for admission must meet University admission requirements, as well as the following additional requirements.

- Bachelor of Arts degree or its equivalent in the primary language, with a 3.00 GPA in all coursework
- Oral and written proficiency: Advanced High on the ACTFL Scale in the primary language
- Demonstration of third-year proficiency in the secondary language

Degree Requirements: a candidate for the M.A. in W.L.L. must have a **minimum of 60 credits**, 40 of which must be earned in residence, distributed among the following areas.

In addition to the required coursework the candidate will:

- Submit two research papers to the graduate committee, one dealing with the primary, the other with the secondary area. These may be written either in the primary or secondary languages, respectively, or in English.
- Be rated in oral and written proficiency in the secondary language only. French and German: Minimum proficiency; Spanish: Advanced; Arabic, Chinese, Japanese, and Russian: Intermediate High.
- Pass a final comprehensive written and oral examination over coursework taken in the primary and secondary areas and over the research papers.
